From the President's Desk



Members, I would like to take the opportunity in this first newsletter of the year to introduce myself to you as your new President and set out my goals for AAUW over the next couple of years.

I have been a victim advocate for over 20 years, and I am currently employed as the Director of Victim Services at the University of Central Florida where I have held my position for over 14 years.

I have also been an adjunct instructor at UCF teaching undergraduate classes in both the Women and Gender Studies program and also Criminal Justice, where I taught Victim Rights.

I have been a certified Crisis Responder for almost 20 years and have been part of teams that responded to both 9/11 and our most recent local event at PULSE nightclub.

Currently, I am the regional coordinator for the Florida Crisis Response Team and an executive board member. My experience includes a wide array of both state and local boards, and I hope that my experience gained from those positions will benefit AAUW.

My passion is advocating for victims of crime, violence and abuse, and the prevention of violence against women. These issues will be a large part of my agenda over the next two years. While we have worked hard as women toward equality of pay, expanded the number of women who are registered voters, and worked on increasing access to education and particularly STEMrelated programs for girls and young women, there are still issues that need more attention. My priority will include human trafficking which impacts a large number of girls and young women who have all their access to human rights, dignity, and education taken away from them.

I will also be sending out a membership survey this fall to learn more about what you would like to see from your AAUW branch in the next two years. You are a valued member, and I would like to include your thoughts and ideas into our monthly meetings and overall agenda in the months ahead. I am also hoping that students from UCF will agree to collaborate on an oral history project. Every member of this branch has a story to tell about her success and struggles as a woman working her way through the professional ranks or about the prejudice and discrimination endured or observed as a woman. Stories will become part of our newsletter and be highlighted on the webpage. I hope you enjoy your participation in AAUW events in the year ahead.

Cooking Globally



The Cooking Globally group held its spring dinner on April 15 at Westminster Winter Park's Club 24. The theme was Philippine cuisine and the meal was coordinated by Debbie Travis who lived in Subic Bay on the

island of Luzon during her middle school years when her father was stationed there with the Army. Debbie recalled her mother and their housekeeper making wonderful dishes. Another member, Pearl Steele, who has visited most of the world, brought some of her Philippine items to share with the group.

Before our meeting, Debbie e-mailed everyone a wonderful mini-history lesson and detailed information about the food, customs, and culinary influences of the island nation. Our dinner reflected the balance of their cooking which combines sweet and sour and salty flavors. We like to cook at least one dish together, and Debbie prepared Pancit (noodles) with a variety of vegetables, chicken and shrimp. Other ladies brought Adobo Pork and Adobo Chicken Wings, both marinated in what seemed like a LOT of vinegar and tasted delicious. Other dishes included *Abobong Gulay*, an eggplant dish, fried rice and white rice. Two desserts completed the meal: a cake made with purple sweet potatoes and coconut macaroon cupcakes.

The summer meeting was July 15 with an Ethiopian theme. Barbara Buchele coordinated the dinner which was held at her home. Rana Tiwari demonstrated *Injera* bread which is prepared with *teff* flour



and cooked like a pancake or crepe. It serves as a kind of plate with the other food on top. Pieces of the bread are broken off and used to pick-up the food. (We used forks!) Other dishes included a tomato salad, sweet potato lentils, Ethiopian cabbage, red lentil dish, a beef dish and a chicken dish (*Doro Wat*) seasoned with *Berbere* spices. These spice mixtures are custom-blended and consist of 15-20 ingredients that give the meat a wonderful taste and lovely reddish color. Ethiopians are not big dessert eaters so we enjoyed a special coffee



prepared by an Ethiopian guest, a friend of Pearl Steele's.

Procrastination had paid off for the Virginia bean-counters.


Booklovers

The Righteous Mind: Why Good People Are Divided by

Politics & Religion by John Haidt.



As America descends deeper into polarization and paralysis, social psychologist Jonathan Haidt has done the seemingly impossible—challenged conventional thinking about morality, politics, and religion in a way that speaks to everyone on the political spectrum. Drawing on his twenty-five years of ground breaking research on


moral psychology, he shows how moral judgments arise not from reason but from gut feelings. Haidt explains why liberals, conservatives, and libertarians have such different intuitions about right and wrong, and

demonstrates why each side is actually right about many of its central concerns.

In this subtle yet accessible book, Haidt gives us the key to understanding the miracle of human cooperation, as well as the curse of our eternal divisions and conflicts. If you're ready to trade in anger for understanding, read *The Righteous Mind*.

Booklovers VII will read *Dark Corners* by Ruth Rendell.

In this tale of psychological suspense, Carl Martin inherits a London house and his father's collection of homeopathic remedies. He rents the top floor to a stranger, his first colossal mistake, and tries to sell some of the medicine. Carl is driven to the edge of madness in a plot of blackmail



and murder. The recently deceased author is the winner of every crime genre award possible, and her novels spurred several TV series.

We were just planning a relaxed week exploring the Emilia-Romagna region of Italy, taking in the famed gastronomy of the region. We would stay a few nights in Parma and a few nights in Bologna and indulge in the Prosciutto di Parma, THE namesake cheese, tagiatelle and tortellini with Bolognese ragu, and sample real Balsamico di Modena. Then, my attention wandered down the *autostrada* on the map and I spotted Sansepolcro. This little town had landed on my bucket list in the early 1990's. Even though we have visited Italy several times and been very near to Sansepolcro more than once, I never actually got there before. Sansepolcro became a "must-see" on our itinerary and my excitement grew.

I hope you are wondering why this modest little town held my interest, because I want to tell you. The one and only attraction there is a monument and memorial to Luca Pacioli. Luca Pacioli was born ca. 1446 and died ca. 1514. He was a mathematician and teacher, and is my favorite unsung hero of the Italian Renaissance. He wrote and published several books, but two in particular made him famous. Summa de arithmetica, geometria, proportioni et proportionalita made him famous in his lifetime. The section "Particularis de Computis et Scripturis," a treatise codifying and describing the "Venetian method" of accounting, established Pacioli as the Father of Accounting. The Summa was the most widely read mathematical book in Italy and was one of the first books published on the Gutenberg press. His fame as a mathematician led to the invitation from Duke Sforza in

Milan to tutor in his court, and made possible the book which made him famous for all time, *De Divina Proportione*. At Sforza's court was young Leonardo da Vinci, who became Pacioli's star student and collaborator on *De Divina Proportione*, contributing illustrations we all recognize, such as "the Vetruvian Man."


In the late 1980s, accounting professionals all over the world began organizing an effort to memorialize Luca Pacioli in Sansepolcro. The plan was to celebrate the 500th anniversary of the publication of the *Summa* in 1994. I made plans to attend that celebration with friends from my study group who prepared for the CPA exam together, but you know how life and living intervene with those little plans. So this summer, Ken made the pilgrimage with me. Now, I can't find the little diary that had that bucket list.

It feels like time to start a new list.


