book most of us are reading this month is:

Orphan Train by Christina Baker Kline.

Two very different women build an unlikely friendship. One is a seventeen-year-old foster child who works off her community service hours at the second woman's home. The second is a nonagenarian survivor of the orphan trains from 1929. This book spotlights a littleknown chapter in American history when orphans from New York City were indentured to families west of Chicago. Some became fortunate adoptees while others were virtual slaves to backbreaking farm or domestic work.

Booklovers VII is reading The Boys in the Boat: Nine



Americans and their Epic Quest for Gold at the 1936 Olympics by Daniel James Brown.

During the Great Depression, a motley group of nine young

men from the U. of Washington's varsity crew challenged the East Coast's ascendancy in rowing, traditionally a sport for the wealthy. Chosen to represent the USA at the Olympics, they overcame poor health, tragedy, and Nazi underhandedness to walk away with gold. Brown tracks each young man's individual journey as well as their collective triumph. (*N.Y. Times Book Review Best Books 2015.*)

Probably the most famous theatre-goer was Abraham Lincoln, whose visit to Ford's Theater on April 14, 1865, was just six days after the Civil War ended. During intermission, Lincoln's guard stepped out to grab a beer. John Wilkes Booth was at the same saloon. And the rest is history. But Lincoln wasn't the only target. On the kill list were Vice President Andrew Johnson, General Ulysses Grant, and Secretary of State William Seward. Only Booth succeeded. Seward survived a stabbing, Johnson's assassin chickened out, and the plans to murder Grant fell through.

At Tech Trek, eighth-grade girls are immersed in a world that empowers and encourages them to think about themselves as future scientists, engineers, mathematicians, and computer specialists.

Tech Trek 2016 will be held in Boca Raton during the week of June 12-18, 2016. Girls entering the 8th grade in the Fall of 2016 will come together to explore STEM (Science, Technology, Engineering and Math) with some Arts and Reading added in to give us STREAM.

What our Branch can do:

The Origins of Turkey Day

"Masked children roaming door-to-door, begging for treats. Adults dressing up for costume parties. Sounds like a normal Halloween—except it wasn't. Less than a century ago, this was Thanksgiving. For decades before WWII, Turkey Day was the day for putting on false faces.



"How did Thanksgiving take such a detour? In the early 19th century, poorer Massachusetts residents started knocking on doors on the holiday's eve begging, 'Something for Thanksgiving?' Soon well-to-do children began dressing in tattered clothes and doing the same.

"The costume idea caught on. When Abraham Lincoln proclaimed Thanksgiving a holiday in 1863, towns be-



gan marking the date with masquerade balls. New York City staged an annual parade to commemorate both Thanksgiving and the British evacuation of New York. "Sensing a business opportunity, stores started selling nightmareinducing papier-mâché masks. So many kids were sporting tattered clothes and darkened faces on Thanksgiving that by the 1900s, it was known as Ragamuffin Day.



"Sadistic New Yorkers threw stove-heated coins known as "red pennies" onto the street and howled in laughter as kids burned their fingers.

"Red pennies failed to stop the ragamuffins, but the Great Depression did. The question 'Anything for Thanksgiving?' was answered with "No."

"Thanksgiving reverted to an austere family-oriented holiday, and by 1950, trick-or-treating had shifted to a less sacred day—Halloween. The change left grownup ragamuffins nostalgic, even about red pennies. 'I remember how my fingers got blistered,' patrolman Leo Carey recalled to the New York Times in 1931. 'But they don't have any real fun like that any more.'"

Summer Berry Pudding

This recipe was modified from the Barefoot Contessa's recipe of the same name.

<u>Required:</u>

- * I use the 2.5 quart French White high-sided round baking dish from Corningware
- * Order two loaves of plain Challah bread (Publix, etc.)
- * Buy Chambord at the liquor store. The very small bottles will be enough.
- * Buy 2.5 lbs of mixed frozen fruit: best are strawberries, blackberries, and raspberries.
 (Blueberries are ok, but not as juicy as the others. You need a lot of juice)

Combine the frozen fruit with 1¼ cups of sugar and ¼ cup of water. Cook on medium until the fruit is unthawed and the raspberries have broken down into juice. Cut the strawberries if too large. When done, remove from heat and add in 2 tablespoons of Chambord.

Slice the Challah into ½ inch thick slices – no thinner, no thicker. Cut off the crusts.

Put 1 cup of berries and juice into the bottom of the dish. This will be your top when unmolded.

- Put one layer of challah bread over the berriesdo NOT overlap. Put more berries/juice over the bread.
- Be generous as the bread will absorb everything. Continue layering, ending with berries/juice.
- Place a sheet of plastic wrap loosely over the top. Put the bowl on top of a plate to catch the overflow.
- Find a plate approximately the same diameter of the inside of the bowl.
- Place it on top of the plastic wrap and weight it all down with several cans.

Place in the refrigerator overnight. Make sure the plastic wrap is loose around the edges. Before unmolding the next day, run a knife around the edge of the bowl.

Serve with sweetened whipped cream with ½ tsp. of vanilla added.
