Annual LAF collection at AAUW Meeting January 13



As Americans, we value our status as a "nation of laws," but we all know that every law enacted, at every level of government, requires *law enforcement*. When that enforcement is not sufficient to assure our fair and equal treatment—as

women—under the intent of the law, we must pursue that equity through the courts. From the very beginning of AAUW in 1881, we have supported efforts to achieve gender equity with our voices, our votes, and now, our funding of legal case support.

Each year since 1981, the Legal Advocacy Fund selects cases which match our mission and goals to offer financial help with case support. **This funding is based on available money in the fund.** It pays for the travel

expenses of plaintiffs and witnesses for depositions and court appearances; it pays for the fees and expenses of expert witnesses. Most of the cases are related to either Title VII of the 1964 Civil Rights Act or Title IX of the 1972 Amendments to the Education Acts of 1963 and 1965. FORTY-SEVEN YEARS LATER AND STILL WE PERSIST!

Most Booklovers will begin the year with Clementine:






Winston Churchill changed the course of history, but the source of his famous resolve was Clementine, his wife. But who was she? Clementine was born into impecunious aristocracy and

the target of cruel snobbery. Many wondered why Winston married her. She was beautiful, intelligent and made his career her mission, guiding him with a raw honesty and keen understanding of what was needed for his political survival. She tempered and stabilized him but her devotion came at the perilous expense of their children.

Purnell captures the intimate dynamic of the Churchills' marriage, their devotion to each other yet curious distance (they slept in separate beds, vacationed separately, and often argued over money and their children.) As you read about Clementine you'll learn how she changed the course of history.

The Churchills are the reading topic of January, and **Booklovers VII** will read *Hero of the Empire: The Boer War, A Daring Escape & the Making of Winston Churchill* by Candice Millard.





minister of England. He arrived in South Africa in 1899, valet and crates of vintage wine in tow, to cover the brutal colonial war the British were fighting with Boer rebels and jumpstart his political career. But just two weeks, later, Churchill was taken prisoner. Remarkably, he pulled off a daring escape—traversing hundreds of miles of enemy territory, alone, with nothing but a crumpled wad of cash, four slabs of chocolate, and his wits to guide him.

Winston Churchill set off as a young man to find battlefield glory with an eye toward emulating his father's political success. His experience as a prisoner in the Boer War begins this book and Millard describes his harrowing escape. This book will hold your attention!

After you've finished celebrating the New Year, here are some other January dates which you may, or may not, care to observe:

On **January 10, 1928**, Leon Trotsky, who had been voted the Communist Most Likely to Succeed Lenin, was exiled to Kazakstan. Early the next year, he was banished from Russia. He was told he could live anywhere, but not how long. In 1940, in a suburb of Mexico City, he was killed by a man who happened by with a pickaxe. Some thought Stalin had a hand in this, but the District Attorney of Mexico City had trouble subpoenaing him. Things might have been different had Trotsky remained in Russia. For instance, he would probably have been killed sooner.

On **January 14, 1914**, Henry Ford inaugurated the assembly line, reducing the time of putting a car together from twelve and a half hours to only 93 minutes. By making automobiles cheap enough for anyone to own, this contrib-

uted significantly to traffic accidents, Mr. Ford's bank account, smog, and the agility of pedestrians.

On **January 17, 1779**, Captain James Cook named the Sandwich Islands after Lord Sandwich, head of the British Admiralty. Capt. Cook was obviously bucking for a promotion and would surely have been made an admiral had he not been slain by islanders who were incensed at the thought of being called Sandwiches. Subsequently, the Sandwich Islands came to be known as the Hawaiian Islands, which was a severe blow to local humorists.

On **January 29, 1889**, Crown Prince Rudolph of Austria-Hungary, heir to the Hapsburg crown, killed his mistress and then took his own life in a hunting lodge. This is the sort of thing that historical novels and popular musicals are made of. Killing a mistress is considered romantic, while killing a wife is considered murder.
