Orlando highlighted several women running in our Central Florida area for city government, school board, and State level seats in Tallahassee.

On Sunday, January 21, 2018, one year from the first "Women's March," 10,000 people gathered once again at Lake Eola in solidarity with a nationwide gathering of men and women from cities large and small. A line-up of speakers, plus posters and banners sent the message about the need to get involved in the political process by (1) getting out the vote in the coming 2018 mid-term elections; and (2) running for office. AAUW member Anna Eskamani is doing just that.





Due to the large crowds, our AAUW sisters were scattered all over the area. One small contingent, however, was able to assemble for another history-making picture.

A woman identified by a scholar as the inspiration for Rosie the Riveter, the iconic female World War II factory worker, has died in Washington state. The New York Times reports that Naomi Parker Fraley died Saturday in Longview. She was 96. Multiple women have been identified over the years as possible models for Rosie, but a Seton Hall University professor in 2016 focused on Fraley as the true inspiration. James J.

Kimble published his findings in the journal Rhetoric & Public Affairs, saying a photo of Fraley at work was the basis for a widely seen poster of a woman flexing with the caption, "We can do it!" Fraley was born in Tulsa, Oklahoma. After the Japanese attack on Pearl Harbor, she went to work at the Naval Air Station in Alameda, among the first women to do war work there.

#### **Black History Month**

Black History Month is a holiday which is celebrated every February in the U.S. and Canada and in October in the U.K. It's an important month for remembering important people, events and achievements of African diaspora. Although it didn't immediately catch on, over the years many different cities all across the country began to recognize Negro History Week. This continued all the way into the late 1960s when Negro History Week was transformed by the Civil Rights Movement into Black History Month.

It wasn't until 1976 that Black History Month would be officially recognized by the federal government. Ever since then, every American president has designated the month of February as Black History Month.

#### An Olympic Used-To-Be

Tug-of-war was an Olympic staple from 1900 to 1920. Part of the track-and-field program, it was a highly contested event that brought out the worst in athletes and fans alike. It was common for spectators to jump out of the stands and help their respective teams pull. The sport's most memorable controversy occurred in 1908 when the heavily favored U.S. team lost in the first round to a group of Liverpool policemen whom they accused of wearing enormously heavy boots with illegal cleats, spikes, and grooved heels. The Americans' protests ulti-

mately fell on deaf ears, and the Liverpudlians went on to capture the silver medal for Britain.



#### Another Olympic Used-To-Be

With the winter Olympics coming up, we're not sure what we'll see with so much press being given to the entry of North Korea. But we know what we definitely won't be seeing in 2018.

Ski ballet! Seriously?

No longer a part of competitive freestyle skiing, **ski ballet** was a third freestyle discipline. Competitions were conducted from the late-1960s until the year 2000. Ballet involved a choreographed routine of flips, rolls, leg crossings, jumps, and spins performed on a smooth slope. After the mid-1970s, the routine was performed to music for 90 seconds. For a short period of time (in the 1980s) there was also **pair ballet** competitions, a variation of ballet, where two people performed tricks that not only included spins, jumps and leg crossing but also lifts and sychronic movements. A panel of judges scored the performance. Ballet was a demonstration sport in the 1988 and 1992 Winter Olympics. The sport has significantly declined in popularity in recent years

due to the fact that it did not become an Olympic sport. The International Ski Federation ceased all formal competition of this sport after 2000.



## Booklovers



The Churchills remain the reading topic in February. **Most Booklovers** will read *Hero of the Empire: The Boer War, A Daring Escape & the Making of Winston Churchill by* Candice Millard.

At the age of twenty-four, Winston Churchill was utterly convinced it was his destiny to become prime minister of England. He arrived in South Africa

in 1899, valet and crates of vintage wine in tow, to cover the brutal colonial war the British were fighting with Boer rebels and jumpstart his political career. But just two weeks, later, Churchill was taken prisoner. Remarkably, he pulled off a daring escape—traversing hundreds of miles of enemy territory, alone, with nothing but a crumpled wad of cash, four slabs of chocolate, and his wits to guide him.

Winston Churchill set off as a young man to find battle-field glory with an eye toward emulating his father's political success. His experience as a prisoner in the Boer War begins this book and Millard describes his harrowing escape. This book will hold your attention!


Booklovers VII will be reading Clementine: The Life of Mrs. Winston Churchill by Sonia Purnell.

Winston Churchill changed the course of history, but the source of his famous resolve was Clementine, his wife. But who was she? Clementine was born into impecunious aristocracy and the target of cruel



snobbery. Many wondered why Winston married her. She was beautiful, intelligent and made his career her mission, guiding him with a raw honesty and keen understanding of what was needed for his political survival. She tempered and stabilized him but her devotion came at the perilous expense of their children.

Purnell captures the intimate dynamic of the Churchills' marriage, their devotion to each other yet curious distance (they slept in separate beds, vacationed separately, and often argued over money and their children.) As you read about Clementine you'll learn how she changed the course of history.



Booklovers IV are reading Re Jane by Patricia Park

A great, imaginative book that explores both the intricacies of a life of a woman simultaneously growing up in two cultures and the issues of loving a married man. Dutiful Jane Re, a half-Korean/half American orphan lives in Flushing Queens and works in her strict uncle's grocery store. As she tries to escape, she discovers a new world. The reader will discover the details of the story.

In early January, the Museums and Galleries Group had a fabulous tour of the 'Dressing Downton' exhibit at the Leitner Museum in St. Augustine. The exhibit featured costumes from the PBS series Downton Abbey and was a delight. The costumes were displayed in rooms furnished with period pieces and carpets; the settings made it seem as though you were right there in the Abbey. ## Walking Group

You are invited to join us for an **airboat ride** on Thursday, February 8, as we move backwards in time and enjoy the surroundings of the old-style Lone Cabbage Fish Camp. It's located on the banks of the beautiful St. John's River on State Road 520 at the Brevard and Orange County lines: 8199 West King Street (SR 520), Cocoa, FL 32926.

There is plenty of free parking and a small public park adjacent to the Camp should you wish to take a short walk – you may see a gator right there!

We will plan to meet no later than 10 a.m. for our reserved **airboat ride** at 10:30. (Normal price is \$24.00 per person, but there is a distinct possibility of a group discount.) We will ride through the grassy marsh of the scenic St. John's River and Lake Poinsett. You will have ample time to view and photograph alligators, bald eagles, wading birds, and maybe wild hogs, cows, and much more.

Prior to the airboat ride we will order our lunch and it will be awaiting us when we disembark! You can in-

dulge in gator tail, frog legs, turtle, or catfish, but there is a large menu that includes chicken for you non-fish eaters. Prices are *very* reasonable with full entrees at \$10 and baskets, sandwiches, and salads under \$10.

The U.S. Weather Bureau was authorized on Feb. 9, 1870, to

provide a central agency to which to address complaints. At first it was called the Weather Department, but the name was changed to Weather Bureau to make it easier to operate under a bureaucracy. Some thought it should be called the Whether Bureau, since it was supposed to know whether it would rain tomorrow.

Feb. 22, 1732 is Washington's Birthday. He was to become famous for chopping down a cherry tree, never telling a lie, and throwing a dollar (a silver dollar—even George couldn't have done it with a dollar bill) across a river. It is probably because of his carelessness with money that banks close on his birthday, as a warning.
