

Laura van den Berg's debut novel, *Find Me*, was a *Time Out New York* and *NPR*'s "Best Book of 2015," long-listed for the International Dylan Thomas Prize, and a WH Smith Fresh Talent selection in the United Kingdom.

She is also the author of two story collections: *What the World Will Look Like When All the Water Leaves Us* and *The Isle of Youth*, both finalists for the Frank O'Connor International Short Story Award. Her honors include the Bard Fiction Prize, the Rosenthal Family Foundation Award from the American Academy of Arts and Letters, a Pushcart Prize, an O. Henry Award, and fellowships from the MacDowell Colony and the Civitella Ranieri Foundation.

Her fiction has been anthologized in The Best American Short Stories, and she has recently

taught creative writing in the M.F.A. Program at Columbia University and at the Bread Loaf Writers' Conference. Laura lives in Cambridge, MA, with her husband and dog. She is a Briggs-Copeland Lecturer in Fiction at Harvard University and teaches in the M.F.A. Program for Writers at Warren Wilson College.

#### Mildred Dresselhaus, the "Queen of Carbon Science"

While perusing the *NY Times* a few days ago, we were surprised to see the obituary of a woman about whom we knew nothing. Maybe she'll be next year's "Hidden Figure." But until that happens, we'd like to tell you about this remarkable woman.

She was born Mildred Spiewak on November 11, 1930, in Brooklyn, the daughter of Polish Jewish immigrants. Her parents moved to the Bronx when Mildred's older brother, a musical prodigy, was accepted at the Bronx House Music School. Two years later, Mildred, also a gifted violinist, received a musical scholarship—to a school in Greenwich Village. She had to take a train and a subway to get there. Carrying her books and violin, she often lost her balance, tumbling down the subway stairs. She was only six at the time!

By the time she got to Hunter College, she was already a math and science whiz but didn't think a science career was possible. At that time, there were only three types of jobs open to women: teaching, nursing, and secretarial. She figured she'd be an elementary school teacher. Encouraged to take a course in elementary nuclear physics, Mildred moved quickly into the sciences, eventually earning a Masters at Radcliffe and a PhD from the University of Chicago. While there, she lived near Enrico Fermi and often walked with him to the campus. Those early morning conversations kept her going through a grueling program in which 75% of the students dropped out.

In Chicago, she met fellow physicist Gene Dresselhaus and married him. She and Gene both ended up at MIT in 1960, one of the few places that would hire husband and wife scientists. At MIT's Lincoln Laboratory, a defense research center, she was one of two women in a staff of 1000 men. "We were pretty much invisible," she later recalled.

Why carbon? She thought it was an interesting material and liked the challenge of working with a material that wasn't especially popular. She explained: "I had young children at the time. If one day I had to be home with a sick child, it wouldn't be the end of the world."

Carbon was an unexplored field. The number of papers published on carbon was zero (although going up and up since her work started).

She was asked if she didn't feel slighted when Nobel Prizes were given out in 1996 and 2010 on work for which she had paved the way. She replied: "Not at all...They had ideas I

missed and they did great work. I've received a lot of recognition for my contributions, and I was a special guest at the Nobel ceremony in 2010."

How was she able to manage a high-powered career with four

children? Like the Notorious RBG, Mildred also had an understanding husband who encouraged her. She also credits a baby sitter who was with her for 29 years!

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



She pioneered research on fullerenes, also known as buckyballs; she also conceived the idea of rolling a single-layer sheet of carbon atoms into a hollow tube (a nanotube having the strength of steel but one ten-thousandth the width of single human hair).

She published more than 1700 scientific papers and co-wrote 8 books. Awards include: the National Medal of Science, the Presidential Medal of Freedom (pictured) the Kavli Prize in Nanoscience; the Enrico Fermi prize and dozens of honorary doctorates.

This month, a G.E commercial boasts a commitment to hiring more women. It shows girls playing with Millie Dresselhaus dolls; parents naming their newborn girls Millie; journalists seeking the next Millie Dresselhaus sighting and asking for selfies with her! She appears in the commercial as well. Like the carbon she chose to study, Mildred could be as soft as the graphite in a pencil or as strong and tough as a diamond.

"During the first centuries of scratching a new country out of the wilderness, American women had considerable legal rights. They ran businesses, owned land, handled money, and made it. But a funny thing happened on the way to the American Revolution: women helped win in 1776 and later in 1812, but lost their own battles. Female autonomy shrank faster than a corseted waistline.



"By the mid-1800s, things looked brighter. England's Victoria, the queen of procreation, endorsed the medical use of chloroform, bringing the era of unavoidably excruciating childbirth to an end. Doctors, including Cuban Henrietta Faber, started washing their hands between patients, and mortality took a nosedive. Women now worked away from home, in places such as garment and shoe factories; what's more, they led labor strikes to improve conditions. In 1854, a high-water mark was hit: 128 female postal workers in the U.S. now earned the same wage as their male peers.

"It had taken guts, and great-heartedness, and a certain grim determination. It had also taken luck—and a big dose of that female secret weapon—longevity. But uppity women around the globe had indeed carved out a brave New World for themselves."

**Nehrling Gardens** 



March 9 will find the Ladies of the Sneakers walking in the Nehrling Gardens of Gotha, Florida. Purchased by Dr. Nehrling in 1885, the forty-acre gardens were first an experimental horticulture station. Other owners continued development until 2009, when the Henry Nehrling Society acquired the now-six-acre site and the present Gardens was born. Preservation, Education, and Conservation became the mission of the Society. The original House and Gardens are now on the National Register of Historic Places and it is a Florida Heritage Landmark. 

#### Notorious RBG, by Irin

Carmon & Shana Frizhnik. Ruth Bader Ginsberg will be the topic of the book that most Booklovers will read in March. Justice Ginsburg never asked for fame—she just tried to make the world a little better and freer. But along the way,



the feminist pioneer's searing dissents and steely strength have inspired millions. *Notorious RBG* was created by a young lawyer and became an Internet sensation. "In my life, what I find most satisfying is that I was a part of a movement that made life better, not just for women," RBG says. "I think gender discrimination is bad for everyone. Having the opportunity to be part of that change is tremendously satisfying." This book takes you behind the myth for an intimate, irreverent look at the justice's life and work.

## Booklovers VII will read **The Stranger** by Albert Camus and **The Mersault Investigation**

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by Kamel Daoud. Booklovers will compare these books together. In *The Stranger*, we meet a young Frenchman named Meursault who arbitrarily kills an Arab in French




Colonial Algeria. Then, railing against God and religion, he is tried without remorse. Through this story of an ordinary man who unwittingly murders an Arab on a sundrenched Algerian beach, Camus explored what he termed "the nakedness of man faced with the absurd." Camus is a Nobel Prize winner.

In 1853, President Franklin Pierce, widely known for his losing battle with the bottle, was arrested in Washington D.C., after he accidentally ran down an elderly lady, Mrs. Nathan Lewis, with his horse.. Mrs. Lewis wasn't injured, but Constable Stanley Edlin placed the president in custody. No matter what kind of executive privileges the president has, the U.S. Constitution doesn't give the president immunity from arrest.

#### In the *Meursault Investigation*,

Daoud turns Camus' masterpiece on its head. He tells the story from the perspective of the murdered Arab's brother showing how language and perspective radically alter a seemingly simple story. (Goncourt Prize winner, *N.Y. Times Book Review* Notable Books 2015.)



Laura van den Berg's debut novel, *Find Me*, is a gripping, imaginative, darkly funny tale of a young woman struggling to find her place in the world. It was featured in *Time Out New York* and *NPR's* "Best Book of 2015," long-listed for the International Dylan Thomas Prize, and a WH Smith Fresh Talent selection in the United Kingdom.

She is also the author of two story collections: *What the World Will Look Like When All the Water Leaves Us* and *The Isle of Youth*, both finalists for the Frank O'Connor International Short Story Award. Her honors include the Bard Fiction Prize, the Rosenthal Family Foundation Award from the American Academy of Arts and Letters, a Pushcart Prize, an O. Henry Award, and fellowships from the MacDowell Colony and the Civitella Ranieri Foundation.

Laura lives in Cambridge, MA with her husband and dog. She is a Briggs-Copeland Lecturer in Fiction at Harvard University and teaches in the M.F.A. Program for Writers at Warren Wilson College.
