We will be meeting at the Center on Tuesday morning, *November 22*, at 10 a.m. for a talk on the history of not only the issues facing the early to mid-twentieth century Jewish community in Europe, but also to reflect on the events that brought an unprecedented world-wide response to tyranny. There are interactive exhibits, artifacts and histories of the many local community members who are survivor-immigrants to our area as well as a short film. Lunch will follow at Francesco's Ristorante in Maitland.

This fall, happy groups of explorers enjoyed a tour of Casa Feliz and an art tour of the Alfond Inn in Winter park. A few of us even learned some anatomy and amazing facts as we investigated some interesting skeletons at a museum in the attractions area!

In the Spring, we will repeat the Wednesday night tour of the Alfond Inn as their exhibits change. They have a surprising and well-curated collection of art interpreted for us by staff from the Cornell Fine Arts Museum.

We will take a break in December and resume in late January with a celebration of Chinese New Year at the Guang Ming Buddhist Temple in Orlando. This month we are reading *Rail Walking* by our own Linda Dunlap. In this book of short stories she showcases a kaleidoscope of characters. We recommend that each member select a story to share so as to provide a wide range of discussion in their sessions..

Rail Walking and Other Stories by Linda Dunlap



Pushcart-nominated writer Linda L. Dunlap invites readers into the lives of characters who struggle to stay hopeful in a troubled world even while the ground shifts precariously beneath their feet.

Dunlap sets her debut collection in the south, but the theme of the stories—

man's battle with himself and the issues with which the characters struggle—are universal. Good doesn't always win out, and honorable people sometimes behave dishonorably. The author's belief that everyone does his/her best, even when their best is often petty and despicable, makes the reader believe this, too. The glue that binds the stories together is the sense of hope the author instills in her characters. This hope is the gift that saves them from despair as they struggle with grace and dignity to make sense of the imperfect world.

Booklovers VII will read :

The Good Daughter: A Memoir of My Mother's Hidden Life by Jasmin Darznik

In 1979, Darznik's parents fled with her from



revolutionary Iran. In her 20's, helping her mother pack for a move, a photo fell from a stack of old letters. The girl pictured there was her mother in a wedding veil, but the groom by her side was a total stranger. Her mother refused to explain. Months later, Jasmin began receiving cassette tapes from her mother revealing the

wrenching true story of her family in Iran, including marriage at 13 and an abandoned daughter. This threegeneration story mirrors the history of Iran over the 20th century. Some material will seem unbelievable to non-Iranians but was read by a member who lived in Iran, and verifies its authenticity. It has been translated into 8 languages. (The author is an award-winning university professor; Library of VA Readers choice Award.)

Myra Gaziano, Ginny Gillmer, Diana Secor, Beth McCarty, and Karen Buchan, all members of the Dining In group, enjoyed a week of cooking school at Casa Gregorio, Lazio, Italy, from September 25 to October 1! We went on the recom-

mendation of two other Dining In members, Lynda Hinkley and Dee Fuentes, who took the trip in 2015.

It is hard to have a bad vacation day in Italy. This trip was no exception. The cooking experience was instructive. There was just enough tension caused by Gregory and Peter's unique combination of "expats with Italian roots" leadership styles to focus our attention. And the natural differences that evolve when the multigenerational participants are all women from distinct parts of North America—Florida, New York, New Mexico, Arizona, Texas and Canada—made for interesting conversations and silences.

But it was the friendly, welcoming, hard-working, local support staff who made the week memorable. Casa Gregorio functions as a large family. Each person plays multiple roles: Driver/Server/Historic Site Guide/Cook/ Translator or (at least in Massimo's case) fine Italian tenor.

The field trips, though typical, provided gems—but you had to listen and ask questions.

When we went to Anna (mother) and Patricio's (son) farm, we met those famous *Bufala Mediterranea Ital-iana*, who provide the most delicious mozzarella. I had no idea that after Campania, Lazio is where to find the largest herds. And, in Lazio, it is typical to add orange zest to sausage. *Delizioso*. I called the trip a success at first bite.

The chef, Valerio, was an excellent and patient instructor who had learned some of his cooking skills from his uncles who own restaurants in Connecticut. He was able to relate to our questions about differences in Lazio preparations and typical Italian American ones. We had fun and I learned a few new techniques. And who would complain about having a full crew of efficient professionals cleaning up after us or getting the wood burning oven going while we toured a dramatic abby nearby.

The wine flowed. The cooking classes became evermore animated until one evening, as we rolled out the pasta,



we broke into a few verses of Tina Turner style "Proud Mary." That prompted Massimo to serenade us in return. Priceless.

We recommend you try the programs at Casa Gregorio. Just remember that you are the key ingredient of your own ex-

perience. Gregorio just provides the venue, but does it quite well.
