

# From the President's Desk

## Wishing you a happy and healthy 2013!

Like many of you, on New Year's Day I like to reflect and analyze my failures, triumphs and accomplishments of the past year and try to record on paper my goals and wishful beginnings for the New Year. Since being president of our branch, I've been pondering a new dimension for the upcoming year's goals to include AAUW. From that perspective it is really hard to believe that the gender pay gap is well and alive in 2013. It is unfortunate and unbelievable that we still need to prioritize this goal and fight for pay equity for women in America. Since 1913, AAUW has been on the front lines of this battle. AAUW members were present in the Oval Office when President Kennedy signed the Equal Pay Act into law. Fifty years later, we, the 51 percent of the American workforce, are still earning about 77 percent of what men earn. That is a gap of 23 percent! Realizing that AAUW has been a catalyst for change since it was instituted in 1881, I am hopeful that in this New Year the wage gap will be ended or significantly narrowed. Working together we can break through this barrier through education and legislation. Our Public Policy Chair, Susan Hoke, is planning ways that we can become empowered and get involved as a branch. Together we must close the pay gap that affects every working woman, from her first paycheck to retirement.

Kicking off the New Year, our branch has two very exciting programs that you do not want to miss.





**PATRICIA FRIEDBERG**

**GUEST SPEAKER AT THIS YEAR'S LITERARY LUNCHEON**



**Patricia Friedberg** was born in London, attended Henrietta Barnett School and The London School of Journalism. She married a South African doctor, who was furthering his studies in London, and together they left for Johannesburg, before settling in Hwange, a mining town in southern Rhodesia, now Zimbabwe.

With no legal experience, she was employed as Clerk of the Court, dealing with tribal and European law.

Later moving from the Hwange to the city of Salisbury, renamed Harare, her government connections as Clerk of the Court allowed her to travel freely into the rural/bush accompanied by a photographer. Her articles were published and produced as *Tribal Documentaries* by the newly formed *Rhodesian TV*.

Patricia wrote a ballet entitled *The Return*, which was performed in Harare and Durban, South Africa. In the 1960s, political unrest continued in Rhodesia, and for the safety of their children, the family reluctantly left Africa to settle in the United States, first in Baltimore, and then in Milwaukee. There she was commissioned to write two docudramas, *Dwellings* and *Babble* for *Public Television*.

Patricia attended a playwriting course at Marquette University where her first play, *Masquerade* won the Play Writer's Award. She established a Children's Theatre

Arts Program, produced and directed two of her works. Two of her plays *Tenement Torment*, and *Through*

*theEye of the Little Green Buddha* were performed by a local theatre group.

Patricia wrote for the *Milwaukee Jewish Chronicle* and was moderator of *People of the Book on WTMJ-TV (NBC affiliate)* Milwaukee. She interviewed major celebrities, politicians, and well-known personalities in the art and music world. She wrote a weekly column entitled *From Land's End to Land's End for the Longboat Observer*, Longboat Key, Florida, and after a return visit to South Africa and Zimbabwe, wrote articles concerning South African art for *The Sarasota Arts Review*.

She wrote a series of children's books entitled *The Alfred Stories*, which were reminiscences of her own childhood in London during World War II, a theme Patricia returns to in the novel *21 Aldgate*.

Studying scriptwriting independently, she wrote the screenplay *Journey from the Jacaranda*, a feature film, which began filming in Zimbabwe in 1997/98 and was interrupted due to civil disobedience and government sanctions.

Children's books entitled *Dear Sammie*, and *Dear Jake...a letter from a grandparent to a child of divorcing parents*, co-authored with her daughter, Adrienne Meloni, were published in 2008.

Patricia is currently working on her second novel: *Rhodesia - A Distant Land* (working title).

She is the mother of four children, each born in a different country, grandmother of eight and has one great-grandson. She and her family all now reside in the United States.


**Women's Military Service Has NEVER Been Easy**

One of Virginia's few soldiers with two X chromosomes, Anna Maria Lane served with honor in the Revolutionary War. With her husband John, she fought bravely at the battle of Germantown—even got wounded and lamed for life. Think that cut any muster with the folks handing out postwar pensions at the Virginia General Assembly? No. At least, not immediately.

But Anna Maria kept on their case. Year after year. Decade after decade. The whole affair came to a brilliant

conclusion on February 6, 1808—a mere 27 years after the war's end—when the Assembly bestirred itself to recognize Lane's "extraordinary military services." They bestowed on her an annual pension of \$100 a year for life. As they told her more than once, "Hey lady! That's more than double what yer husband got." Satisfying as that moment must have been, Lane managed to collect her pension just twice before quitting the planet. For Virginia bean-counters, patriotic procrastination had paid off.

## PUBLIC POLICY

As 2012 wanes and 2013 looms on the horizon, women in the work force continue to earn only 77 cents on the dollar to their male counterparts. According to one estimate, college-educated women working full-time earn more than a half million dollars less than their male peers over the course of a lifetime. While we are aware of the wage gap, did you know it takes until about mid-April 2013 for female income to equal male wages earned in the twelve months of 2012. This date, known as Equal Pay Day, will be observed by AAUW on Tuesday, April 9. I am working on plans for our branch to recognize this date.

## DID YOU KNOW THAT . . . ?

Women now make up a third of all the lawyers and doctors in the U.S. In 1970, women represented only 9.7 percent of the nation's doctors, and less than 4.9 percent of its lawyers.

Michigan Democratic state Rep. Lisa Brown was banned from speaking on the House floor in June by indignant male Republicans for uttering the word "vagina" during a debate on abortion.


