Judith Kaplan is a graduate of Hunter College, New York, N.Y., and the Bronx High School of Science, Bronx, N.Y. She was honored as one of the "Feminists Who Changed America 1963-1975," published by University of Illinois Press. This new and groundbreaking directory was released on November 13, 2006. It presents biographies of more than 2,200 women and men whose successful actions created the modern women's movement.

Judy, a feminist for as far back as she can remember, was also an early member of the founding chapter of the National Organization for Women, NOW-NY, and served as its Treasurer. It was at this time that she decided to do a series of first day covers on women's history for the organization.

A resident of Florida since 1980, Ms. Kaplan formerly resided in Ocala and Boca Raton, Florida. She now resides in Altamonte Springs.

One hundred thirty-five years ago, 17 college-educated women came together to find community. They had fought for and obtained higher education—not an easy feat at the time. Mentorship was unheard of, and women were

hardly made to feel welcome at colleges so they leaned on one another. Together these pioneers created the legacy of empowering women and girls that AAUW carries on today.

Our mission is as relevant today as it was in 1881, when our founders first met. To keep advancing our mission, we must continue to recruit and engage potential members. Share some of AAUW's work from 2016 to open a conversation with potential members in the year ahead. AAUW's research shows that while women are not new to leadership, they are still outnumbered by men in the most prestigious positions from Capitol Hill to the board-room.

When Jessica Valiente earned a 2014-15 AAUW American Fellowship, she was in the process of completing her dissertation for a doctorate in musical arts from the City University of New York. She used the award to cover child care for her three daughters. "Without the AAUW fellowship, I would not have had the time to complete my dissertation, because I would not have had anyone to help me with the kids," says Valiente, an accomplished flutist.

Valiente did finish, but the hard work isn't over. Between homeschooling her three daughters and working on her career as a performer and band leader, Valiente has her hands full. Her regular practice time is between 10 p.m. and 2 a.m. each night. She's interested in a future in academia, but says the limited tenure-track positions that are available in her field often go to male musicians.

"It is still true that women in my field are held to a higher standard than men" Valiente says. "If you want to be accepted and hired, you are going to have to prove yourself."

Her advice to young women interested in pursuing a similar career path is simple: "Never assume that you don't have the fight to be doing what you are doing, and never apologize for it!" She adds, "If no one is presenting you with your niche, make your niche."

The Paris Architect by Charles Belfoure



The Wright Brothers by David McCullough





ry teachers, community education programs, parents who homeschool their children, as well as college classes in arts integration, reading, or language arts." (review from *Amazon*)



FEBRUARIUS
