



We knew that AAUW had a writing contest (our very own Linda Dunlap has been a multiple recipient of those prizes). But, until the other day, [thanks to Aruna Moidu], we learned that AAUW has been sponsoring an art contest for eight years. (Why hasn't this been more advertised?) According to AAUW, "We hear about the gender gap all the time—in salary, in math and science fields, in leadership. But one of the most glaring and longstanding gaps is in the art world. For centuries, women artists were unrecognized, unencouraged, or even discredited simply because they were not men.

"Today, things have changed . . . some. Still, in 2012, only 4 percent of artists on display at the Metropolitan Museum were women. There remains just <u>one</u> major museum in the world dedicated solely to women artists [the National Museum of Women in the Arts in N.Y.]. That's why we host an annual art contest to get women artists the equal attention they deserve.

The six winning entries will be featured in a collection of

note cards mailed to AAUW members in the spring."





A Downtown Stroll among Azaleas and Architecture

Those never pedestrian ladies of the Walking Group will enjoy an urban oasis on Thurs., March 10, thanks to the efforts of Sandy Breeden and Barbara Knapp.

Dickson Azalea Park is a miniature, enchanting neighborhood park of five acres about 1.5 miles from Orlando's commercial downtown and has been described as "calmness in the heart of the city." Its ravine with a minuscule babbling brook, Fern Creek, winds through a microcosm of plant life.

The park is part of the Lake Lawsona Historic District developed between 1911 and the 1950s. An additional highlight of this excursion will be the walking tour led by Richard Forbes, Historic Preservation Officer for the City of Orlando. The district contains a variety of architectural styles including bungalows, craftsman, colonial, Mediterranean, mission, neoclassical, and Tudor revivals.

Our morning will conclude with lunch at Dexter's in Thornton Park.

This month most Booklovers will read *The Boys in the Boat* by Daniel James Brown and Booklovers VII will read *The Orphan Train* by Christine Baker Kline.

The Boys in the Boat by Daniel James Brown



Out of the depths of the Depression comes the improbable, intimate account of how nine working-class boys from the American West showed

the world at the 1936 Olympics in Berlin what true grit really meant. With rowers who were the sons of loggers, shipyard workers, and farmers, the University of Washington's eight-oar crew was never expected to defeat the elite teams of the East Coast and Great Britain, yet they did, going on to shock the world by challenging the German boat rowing for Adolf Hitler. The emotional heart of the tale lies with Joe Rantz, a teenager without family or prospects, who rows not only to regain his shattered self-regard but also to find a real place for himself in the world. Drawing on the boys' own journals and vivid memories of a once-in-a-lifetime shared dream, Brown has created an unforgettable portrait of an era, a celebration of a remarkable achievement, and a chronicle of one extraordinary young man's personal quest.

Orphan Train by Christina Baker Kline.



Two very different women build an unlikely friendship. One is a seventeen year old foster child who works off her

community service hours at the second woman's home. The second is a nonagenarian survivor of the orphan trains from 1929. This book spotlights a little known chapter in American history when orphans from New York City were indentured to families west of Chicago. Some become fortunate adoptees while others were virtual slaves to backbreaking domestic work or farm work.

The Book Selection Committee has met and selected some 50 plus books for Booklovers to choose from in selecting books for next year. They have been formatted into a document and sent to all Booklovers. Please review the list carefully and select the ones that have literary or educational merit and promote intellectually stimulating discussions. 
