Hollywood actor Geena Davis saw her career go into a tailspin when she turned 40. Suspecting an industry bias against women, she commissioned a study on gender attitudes in family films and TV shows. The re-

sults? Women make up 30 percent of all speaking roles in those media, and only 17 percent in crowd scenes. That 17 percent appears to be a magic number – it is everywhere in this area. The U.S. Congress, Fortune 500 Board members, law partners, tenured college professors, military leadership, and cardiac surgeons all include just 17 percent women. But on the upside, an 8-year-old girl in Maine, having heard on TV, in her young lifetime, only Olympia Snowe and Susan Collins as the state's U.S. senators, asked her father, "Daddy, can boys grow up to be senators?" Role-modeling does work.

I was privileged in November to have a guided tour of the Pace Center for Girls, and also to assist in serving Thanksgiving dinner to those girls and their families. I recommend both. You'll have to wait a year for the dinner gig, but see Barbara Knapp about getting on the list for the next tour. You won't regret it.

The area was virtually deserted but we knew the Doubletree Hotel was close by. We took a taxi, and upon arrival at the hotel, were able to contact the ship. We were instructed to go to the Moevenpick Hotel—a taxi ride BACK to the dock area. The Hotel was unaware of any special arrangements with Viking so the ship was contacted again. Eventually we had a room and we slept in our clothes.

One of the most famous paintings of American history is Washington Crossing the Delaware. Brave General Washington, standing in the boat, leading his men

across the river on Christmas Eve, 1776, to surprise the British at the Battle of Trenton. It has all the elements of a true painting of Americana: George Washington, Christmas and weary soldiers. What it didn't have were its facts straight. A German artist named Emanuel Leutze painted the work 75 years after the battle; he used American tourists as models and the Rhine River for the Delaware. He got the style of the boat wrong, the clothing was incorrect, even the American flag was wrong (the flag depicted hadn't been created at the time of the battle). But why let facts get in the way of a little history, right? And hey, it's still a nice painting.

An article in the Dec. 2004 issue of the British medical journal proposed that a child's belief in Santa Claus encourages their moral development as they believe he knows which children are good or bad. Dr. Lynda Breen, the psychiatrist who wrote the article, says the myth "is a useful ace up a parent's sleeve." But who suffers the most when the child eventually grows out of believing in Santa? "Most of the evidence suggests that children are actually quite positive when they find out the truth and it is actually parents who mourn the loss."
