MARTIUS



March, called *Martius* by the Romans, got its name from Mars, the god of war. It was considered a propitious time to start fighting, provided you outnumbered the enemy. March was the first month of the year until 46 B.C. when Julius Caesar, who

had to do something to get his mind off Cleopatra, started messing around with the calendar. It continued to be the beginning of the legal year in England until 1752, the English not wishing to make a change hastily. St. Patrick, patron saint of Ireland, died on March 17 in 464. The most famous legend told of him is that he miraculously drove all the snakes and venomous creatures from the island by banging a drum. He did so well that Irish soil is still supposed to be death to any such beast that touches it. Another legend says that he used the shamrock, with its three leaves and a single stem, to illustrate the idea of the Trinity. On his deathbed he asked

his friends to have a drink to ease their pain. Compliance with his last words is an explanation of the Irish predilection for whiskey.

Ellen Swallow Richards (1842 - 1911)

AAUW was originally called the Association of Collegiate Alumnae (ACA). Ellen Swallow Richards, co-founder, is also credited with founding the field of home economics. She attended Vassar, earning her bachelor's degree in two years!

On December 10, 1870, after some discussion, Swallow became the first woman admitted to Massachusetts Institute of Technology where she was able to continue her studies, "it being understood that her admission did not establish a precedent for the general admission of females" according to the records of the meeting of the MIT Corporation on December 14, 1870.

In 1873, Swallow received a bachelor of science degree from MIT for her thesis, "Notes on Some Sulpharsenites and Sulphantimonites from Colorado." She continued her studies at MIT and would have been awarded its first advanced degree, but MIT balked at granting this distinction to a woman and did not award its first advanced degree, a Master of Science in Chemistry, until 1886.

Richards applied her scientific knowledge to the home. As the persons responsible for the home and family nutrition, Richards felt that all women should be educated in the sciences.



She was an expert in the preparation of nutritious foods and led the first survey of water quality in America. The survey prompted Massachusetts to establish the first water-quality standards and municipal sewage treatment plant in the country. Richards was also the foremost female industrial and environmental chemist of her era and a huge advocate of educating women in science.

Country Girl: A Memoir by Edna O'Brien.

One of the greatest Irish writers of the 20th century, O'Brien did not enjoy a straight line rise to international fame and critical regard. For many years, O'Brien's novels were banned in her native Ireland for indecency. Now in more open-minded times, her fiction is

seen for what it always was—richly illuminating and candid depictions of women's needs and desires, rendered with no sentimentality or salaciousness. Born into a rural family that once knew wealth but at the time of her birth had only memories of better times, Edna had a precocious interest in being a writer. When Dublin beckoned she answered the call by apprenticing in a chemist's shop "convinced she would meet poets and one day would be admitted into the world of letters." She moved to London during the swinging 60s and began writing in earnest. Her book is a testament to a writer's tenacity. (Frank O'Connor Prize, Irish PEN Award)







Did You Know?

On **March 14**, people around the world celebrate the math symbol that represents the constant formed by the ratio of the circumference of a circle to its diameter,

or approximately 3.14159. Though pi was discovered 4,000 years ago, it wasn't until Larry Shaw at San Francisco's Exploratorium Science Center decided to dedicate a day to it in 1988—by throwing and eating pies—that pi got to party. In 2009, the U.S. House of Representatives formally declared March 14 National Pi Day. On 3/14/15 at 9:26:53 a.m. and p.m., a rare sequential time will occur in which the date and time represent the first 10 digits of pi: 3.141592653 Dutch scientist Ellen Kooijman discovered that most Lego characters are men. So when Lego issued a call to design female figures, Kooijman thought of scientists: a paleontologist, an astronomer and a chemist. None wears pink. Encouraged by online support, Lego decided to make the set a reality. Kooijman hopes that the new set will show girls that science is just as

viable a career choice for them as it is for boys. While basically satisfied with Lego's execution of her designs, she has one criticism. "I highly discourage wearing makeup in the lab. It can contaminate the materials you work with!"

Enjoy the Rites of Spring at the Waterhouse Residence Museum. Each spring, Florida's Victorianera families engaged in seasonal celebrations, spring cleaning, gardening, and decorating with cut flowers.

Museum educators will take you on a special tour of the house, discussing the typical Easter menu in 1885, the origins of the Easter Bunny, and old-fashioned eggdyeing (wrap the egg in calico fabric and boil in lye). Period housecleaning items are on display, including a pair of wire rug beaters and an early Bissell carpet sweeper. Join us and learn something new about springtime traditions! This historic house museum reflects the life of a middle-class Victorian family during the early days of the city of Maitland. The home was originally built by Maitland resident and carpenter William Waterhouse in 1884.


