And please note that on April 14, we observe equal-pay day—one of AAUW's most important issues.

The good news membership-wise is that our Branch has had the greatest growth numbers of *any branch* in Florida! We even did better than the large branch in Venice! And we have continued to grow since National's numbers were compiled. Some stats:

- ◆ Number of members before September's Membership Tea: 145
- ◆ Number joining at and shortly after Tea: 29
- ◆ Number joining since then: 19
- ◆ Present Total Membership: **193**

This is more than National credits us with, but there are reasons for the disparity. We will continue to monitor and adjust our numbers.

This growth spurt is surely attributable to Membership VP Judy Alper, to former VP Barbara Buchele, and to the good work done by all of our volunteers! Consider these factors, which certainly play a huge part in attracting our friends and neighbors:

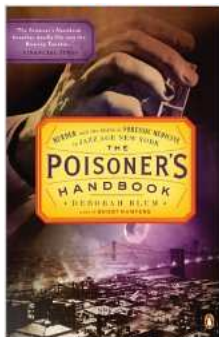

### April 2015 Selections

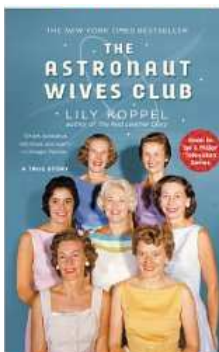


Most Booklovers will be reading ***The Poisoner's Handbook: Murder and the Birth of Forensic Medicine in Jazz Age New York*** by Deborah Blum.

This is a Jazz Age tale of chemistry and detection, poison and murder. In early twentieth-century, New York was an easy path to the perfect crime. Science had no place in the

Tammany Hall-controlled coroner's office, and corruption ran rampant. However, with the appointment of chief medical examiner Charles Norris in 1918, the poison game changed forever. Together with toxicologist Alexander Gettler, the duo set the justice system on fire with their trailblazing scientific detective work, triumphing over seemingly unbeatable odds to become the pioneers of forensic chemistry and the gatekeepers of justice.

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### Booklovers III

Booklovers III will read ***The Astronaut's Wives Club*** by L. Koppel. Beginning with the announcement in 1959 of the seven Mercury astronauts, Koppel paints chatty, personal portraits of each woman as she adjusts to dramatic changes: one day

she's living the life of an ordinary military wife, the next she's married to a major celebrity. The wives were closely monitored by NASA and expected to be perfect, right down to what they wore and what food they served their husbands. The U.S. moon program ended in 1972—but many of these unique women still remain connected, friends now for more than 50 years.

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### Booklovers VII

Booklovers VII are reading ***The Age of Innocence*** by Edith Wharton.

This classic novel takes place in old New York. Newland Archer prepares to marry May Welland—tender and impressionable, with equal purity of mind and manners.

But his world is changed forever by the return of the mysterious Countess Ellen Olenska, a woman of quick wit sharpened by experience, not afraid to flout convention and determined to find freedom in divorce. Newland is drawn to the socially ostracized Ellen Olenska. He knows that in sweet-tempered May, he can expect stability and the steadying comfort of duty. But what new worlds could he discover with Ellen? Edith Wharton's masterpiece is a tragic love story and a powerful homily about the perils of a perfect marriage (Pulitzer Prize-winner).
