It would be 57 years before another woman served on the Supreme Court of Texas.

Last year we had a number of interesting trips to area museums and cultural centers as well as restaurants. Among others, we visited the Mennello Museum and viewed works by Jamie and Andrew Wyeth; we were taught excellent calligraphy at the Guang MingTemple; we listened to a scholarly historical talk on the events leading up to WWII at the Holocaust Museum and learned of the oral history recorded about African-American life in West Winter Park as well as the history of central Florida weaving and quilt-making at the Hannibal Square Heritage Center. We met on occasion at the Alfond Inn for the 'First Wednesday' art tours and many other interesting exhibits.

This year we will meet for museum or cultural tours on the *second Wednesday of the month* in the morning, starting in October, followed by lunch at a nearby restaurant. In addition to our scheduled monthly event, as community events are posted, we will note in the newsletter some ideas to pursue on your own or perhaps with a friend for events that occur on days other than our regular meeting time.

We generally try to arrange for a docent-led tour and there may be a fee or request for donations from some of the venues. Blackman.


This book is about an old grump who goes about the locality being bad-tempered, disagreeable, and enforcing neighborhood-watch-type rules that he himself has made up. As we learn more

about his life, we find out how this once-shy man became a cantankerous old curmudgeon. His journey is both amusing and sad. This novel has been made into a film.

Booklovers II is reading *The Garden of Evening Mists* by Tan Twan Eng.

Judge Yun Ling has spent forty years prosecuting the

same Japanese war criminals that once held her and her sister Yun Hong hostages in a World War II prison camp located in the depths of the Malaysian jungle. The suffering during her internment robbed her of her sister, her identity, and of her future. Yun Ling returns to *The Garden of Evening Mists*, an oasis between daybreak and sunset, and the only



place where the Judge can bask in the roundness of everything beautiful and sorrowful about life. Aritomo, the renowned gardener of the Japanese Emperor guides her through. (Man Booker Prize shortlist 2012, Man Asian Literary Prize 2013, Walter Scott Prize 2013, International IMPAC Dublin Literary Award shortlist 2014.)




Booklovers VI begins the year with *Nineteen Eighty-Four* by George Orwell.

In literary political fiction and dystopian science-fiction, *Nineteen Eighty-Four* is a classic novel in content, plot, and style. Many of its terms and concepts, such as Big

Brother, doublethink, thoughtcrime, Newspeak, Room 101, telescreen, 2 +2 = 5, and memory hole, have entered into common use since its publication in 1949. *Nineteen Eight-Four* popularized the adjective *Orwellian*, which describes official deception, secret surveillance, and manipulation of recorded history by a totalitarian or authoritarian state. In 2005 the novel was chosen by *Time* magazine as one of the best 100 English-language novels from 1923 to 2005. It was awarded a place on the list of Modern Library 100 Best Novels.

Booklovers VII is reading *A Place We Knew Well* by Carol McCarthy.

For 13 days in October 1962, the world held its breath—seemingly on the brink of nuclear war. Set against the backdrop of Cold War panic and politics, this novel tells the intimate and human story of a family whose own hearts are at war. Set in our own College Park.



Women have been symbols of justice since the Egyptian goddess Ma'at, but men have kept the scales of justice from them for just as long. By the time Sandra Day O'Connor appeared on the scene, a statue of Lady Justice adorned most courthouses, but actual lady justices—or even lady lawyers—were still very much unwelcome.

In 1869, Myra Bradwell attempted to become America's first female lawyer. She passed the Illinois bar exam, but the state supreme court refused to give her a law license. When Bradwell brought the case of the U.S. Supreme Court in 1872, she lost. The justices deemed that "the natural and proper timidity and delicacy which belongs to the female sex evidently unfits it for many of the occupations of

civil life," and described a woman seeking such a career as "repugnant."

For the next 7 decades, states could legally deny women the opportunity to practice law—and did. (Charlotte E. Ray, the first black female lawyer, was admitted to the Washington D.C., bar in 1872 because she went by her initials and the committee assumed she was a man.) At the turn of the century, famed lawyer Clarence Darrow told a group of woman attorneys, "You have not a high grade of intellect . . . I doubt if you can ever make a living."

By 1950, only three percent of lawyers were women.







Tao Porchon-Lynch marched with Gandhi and Martin Luther King Jr. But those walks were just a warm-up. At 85, she took up ballroom dancing and appeared on America's got Talent. At 97, she's also the world's oldest yoga instructor

After a lifetime of pencil pushing, Edith Wilma Connor left her data entry job and started pumping iron. For her 65th

birthday, she entered her first bodybuilding competition—and won. By age 77, she'd earned a Guinness World Record for becoming the oldest competitive female bodybuilder.

After reading that no woman had ever completed the 2,180-mile Appalachian Trail, Emma Gatewood, a 67-year-old grandmother of 23, set out on a 146-day journey. She went through six pairs of sneakers on her trek—then hiked the Trail twice more.

In her 60's, Barbara Hillary retired from nursing. But when she learned no African American woman had ever set foot on the North Pole, she found a new purpose. At 75, she tagged the North Pole. Four years later, she hit the South Pole, too, making her the first African American woman to visit both.
