We are delighted to present Anna Eskamani, newly elected to the Florida House of Representatives from District 47, and former member of our AAUW chapter. (The following is from Representative Eskamani's Facebook page.)

Anna V. Eskamani is an Orlando native

and daughter of immigrants who has worked relentlessly her entire life to protect all members of our community through effective advocacy, bold leadership, and strategic management.

A community organizer and nonprofit professional, Anna has a proven track record in building consensus while fighting unapologetically for progressive values. She attended Orange County Public Schools, K-12 and went to the University of Central Florida. Here she earned two Bachelor Degrees, and two Master Degrees.

When Anna was thirteen years old, she lost her Mom to cancer. This loss —coupled with her Mom's courage—is what inspires Anna each day to fight for Florida's families.

For the last six years, she served as the Senior Director of Public Affairs and Communications for Planned Parenthood of Southwest and Central Florida. Here she managed a team of six across 22 counties and 11 health centers. She is known in the legislature and across the nation as an advocate for women's health and equality. Today she works at NEO Philanthropy as their State Strategic Advisor.

Anna is also a Ph.D student in Public Affairs at the University of Central Florida and, when she has time, serves as an adjunct professor teaching Intro to Women's Studies. She is currently developing a new course for UCF on community organizing for nonprofit professionals and also serves on numerous community boards.

Tough, authentic and unafraid, Anna is a progressive who has proven herself as a leader who works hard, delivers results, and gets things done. Through her campaign, she has raised nearly \$500,000 from more than 3,000 individual donations. Her team has also knocked on more than 27,000 doors with the help of more than 400 volunteers. This is a grassroots campaign that is people-focused and fueled by you.

We have an exciting year of Saturday morning speakers and singers invited by Karen Gillett, Vice President for Programs. These are listed on your handy refrigerator card designed by Linda Fessel. Please get one for yourself and a few more for friends! We always welcome guests and had 20 at our Membership Reception.

At the national level, AAUW has asked both the states and individual branches to become more involved with missionfocused activities in the three strategic areas of Education and Training, Economic Security, and Leadership.

I would like our Branch to consider applying for a Community Action Grant, so I am soliciting both your ideas on what we might do and your willingness to work on the implementation of the grant if we are awarded one. Please call 321-231-2007 or email me <u>Islieberman@gmail.com</u> with your ideas by October 10. The deadline for submission of a proposal is December 1, 2019.

Community Action Grants provide funds to individuals, AAUW branches, and AAUW state organizations as well as local community-based nonprofit organizations for innovative programs or non-degree research projects that promote education and equity for women and girls. Grant projects must have direct public impact, be nonpartisan, and take place within the United States or its territories. Special consideration is given to projects focused on K–12 and community college girls' and women's achievements in science, technology, engineering, or math.

One-year grants provide funding for community-based projects. Topic areas are unrestricted, but should include a clearly defined activity that promotes education and equity for women and girls. Two-year grants provide startup funds for new projects that address the particular needs of the community and develop girls' sense of efficacy through leadership or advocacy opportunities. Topic areas are unrestricted, but should include a clearly defined activity that promotes education and equity for women and girls. Here are some of the winning projects for 2019-20:

- 1. PowerPlay NYC, Inc. (2011) uses physical activities and Olympic sports as a way to develop confidence, team building skills, and life skills in minority girls living in Brooklyn. PowerPlay NYC connects girls with female role models in areas that focus on fitness, mentoring, and education.
- 2. WriteGirl (2009) is a leadership program that provides young and incarcerated women the opportunity to write, edit, and create blogs for WriteGirl.
- 3. ECO Girls (2012) seeks to foster environmental awareness, leadership, ecological literacy, cultural education, and self-confidence. The organization focuses specifically on reaching girls of color and girls in economically challenged areas of Southeast Michigan who have limited access to green spaces.
- 4. Hidden Herstory (2010) is a national educational networking tour that features a screening of the documentary *Top-Secret Rosies: The Female Computers of WWII*. Targeting universities, museums, and archives, the tour seeks to connect women professionals working in math, science, and computer technology with high school girls and college women interested in pursuing careers in these fields.
- 5. Camp GirlForward (2012) is an innovative summer education program for refugee girls ages 14–19. With a social justice-based curriculum, Camp GirlForward empowers girls to understand who they are, where they are from, and how they can make a difference in the world around them. The program includes research projects, presentations, journal writing and reading, and weekly field trips around Chicago.

In its ninth year, the Women of Distinction award by Faculty Excellence and the Center for Success of Women Faculty highlights the achievements of outstanding women faculty at UCF. Three awards – one for one-to-five years of service in academia at UCF, six-to-ten years, and ten or more years—in the theme of "Creative Entrepreneurship"—were given at the event on Tuesday, September 10.

Dr. Anne Bubriski (on left) is the winner in the one-to-five years of service category. In her four years as a lecturer in Women's and Gender Studies, Dr. Bubriski spearheaded and expanded the Young Women Leaders Program, an after-school curriculum-based mentoring program assigning a 7th grade "little sister" to one UCF student "big sister," including securing outside funding. After winning a grant and piloting a smaller one-day pro-

gram focused on STEM leadership, she saw an opportunity and transformed the program into SLAM: **S**cience **L**eadership **a**nd **M**entoring in 2019. Through SLAM, Dr. Bubriski has secured funding to empower girls to be assertive, brave, confident and to develop leadership abilities while exposing them to exciting STEM careers. In partnership with a local middle school, SLAM meets weekly with 20 UCF women in STEM majors and provides programming with workshops and guest speakers.

Each winner will receive one-thousand dollars in professional development funds from the President's Office. Congratulations, Anne.

■ For the first time in the U.S. Army's 244-year history, two sisters have attained the rank of general. At a historic promotion ceremony in Arlington, Va., Maj. Gen. Maria Barrett – already a two-star general – presented her younger sister Brig. Gen. Paula Lodi with a beret bearing her new one-star



rank insignia. The daughters of a World War II vet father, both siblings have excelled in the military. Barrett, 53, commands NETCOM, which runs the Army's cybernetworks, while Lodi, 51, is director of health-care operations for the Army's surgeon general.
