#### We are thrilled to welcome back Gabe Preisser

Praised for his "matinee idol charm and charisma," "a beautiful, luscious baritone," and "a compelling, commanding stage presence" by publications such as Opera News, the Star Tribune, and the Houston Chronicle, Gabriel Preisser receives rave reviews for his vast repertoire of performances. Last season, he performed the role of Figaro in The Barber of Seville with Opera Orlando and in Le nozze di Figaro with Inland Northwest Opera (formerly Opera Coeur d'Alene). # From the President



Dear Members,

Well, this will be my 75th Christmas/ Hanukkah/Winter Solstice/New Year's celebrations, but I am not sure how many Kwanzaas. I am sure that I did not celebrate the first few after it was initiated in 1966-67 as a secular festival. Kwanzaa means the 'first

fruits of harvest' in Swahili and is celebrated for 7 days with each day representing a particular principle.

Although AAUW is non-partisan, members are both political and principled. Sadly, as I watched and listened to the impeachment inquiry, I realized that many of our current political leaders hold principles other than those I value. So, I thought it would be worth sharing principles I do value. Kwanzaa embodies these principles that hold a particular relevance for women who, regardless of ancestral origins, have traditionally and continue to be oppressed economically and legally. At the risk of committing cultural appropriation, I list these principles with some comments:

(UNITY): To strive for and to maintain unity in the family, community, nation, and race. (I interpret this as embracing racial and ethnic diversity. Diverse groups can unite around various issues.)

(SELF-DETERMINATION): To define and name ourselves, as well as to create and speak for ourselves. (Women must advocate for themselves.)

(COLLECTIVE WORK AND RESPONSIBILITY): To build and maintain our community together and make our

brothers' and sisters' problems our problems and to solve them together. (Issues of gender inequality affect both women and men and require everyone to work to change society.)

(COOPERATIVE ECONOMICS): To build and maintain our own stores, shops, and other businesses and to profit from them together. (Pay inequity if influenced by gender, race and age.)

(PURPOSE): To make our collective vocation the building and developing of our community in order to restore our people to their traditional greatness. (Recently, the US has lost its world standing, and this must be repaired to effect global alliances that benefit all partners.)

(CREATIVITY): To do always as much as we can, in the way we can, in order to leave our community more beautiful and beneficial than we inherited it. (The issues of global warming require all of us to be mindful of our actions that have an impact on our environment.)

(FAITH): To believe with all our hearts in our people, our parents, our teachers, our leaders, and the righteousness and victory of our struggle. (AAUW will co-host a 'victory party' celebrating the centennial of the 19th Amendment on February 15, 2020. Save the Date!) Happy Holidays,

AAUW Orlando-Winter Park Branch Literary Luncheon March 7, 2020, at the Interlachen Country Club Speaker: Ambassador Harriet Elam-Thomas Book: Diversifying Diplomacy: My Journey from Roxbury to Dakar

**Diversifying Diplomacy** tells the story of Harriet Elam–Thomas, a young black woman who beat the odds and challenged the status quo, distinguishing herself with a diplomatic career at a time when few colleagues were women of color. Her amazing memoir is a firsthand account of her decades-long career in the US Department of State's Foreign Service, recounting her experiences of making US foreign policy,

culture, and values understood abroad. Elam-Thomas served as ambassador to Senegal and retired with the rank of career minister after forty-two years as a diplomat. In *Diversifying Diplomacy*, Elam-Thomas is confronted by some of the world's heftier problems and helps to ensure that new shepherds of honesty and authenticity will follow in her international footsteps for generations to come.
