

From the President



Dear Branch Members,

Congratulations to Myra Gaziano and her Literary Luncheon and Silent Auction Committee and all of us who attended for making this our MOST financially successful and greatly enjoyed event. More details appear in this *Branchline*.

We will not have a General Meeting this month and the May meeting is pending based on the development of the COVID-19 pandemic. Because April is the month in which we hold elections, I urge you to please vote on the slate of officers or suggest others, so that we can accomplish this by email or mail balloting.

I know that March, not April, is Women's History Month; but since I am writing this in March, I thought I would include pioneering women bacteriologists who made significant contributions to earlier epidemics and infectious diseases in the first half of the 20th century. I choose bacteriology rather than virology or the contemporary designation 'microbiology' as there are now numerous women scientists in this area.

Ida Albertina Bengtson (1881–1952) was the first woman hired to work in the <u>United States Public Health Service</u>'s Hygienic Laboratory at the <u>National Institutes of Health</u>. She helped discover that the source of the 1917 tetanus outbreak running rampant across the US could be traced back to a batch of contaminated vaccine scarifiers, the tool used to scratch the skin when performing some types of vaccinations. Bengtson's most significant scientific achievement was identifying <u>Clostridium botulinum</u>, the cause of botulism. The Latin word for sausage is botulus and "Sausage poisoning" was a common problem in 18th- and 19th-century Germany. The bacterium thrives in an anaerobic (no oxygen) environment which is why setting standards for commercial and home canning of uncontaminated foods is so important. In 1924-31 she investigated the trachoma, a cause of the blindness epidemic in Alabama, Missouri, Tennessee, and Oklahoma. She worked on gas gangrene toxins and anti-toxins and typhus which she contracted but recovered and wrote a classic chapter on Rickettsia, a family of bacteria carried by ticks, lice, and other bugs, that causes typhus and Rocky Mt. Spotted Fever.

Measles researcher Jean Alice Broadhurst (1873- 1954) developed a method in 1917 of detecting the measles virus before the appearance of the characteristic rash. She did not identify the cause of measles as a virus since it was not isolated until 1954. A third set of researchers: bacteriologist <u>Pearl Louella Kendrick (1890 - 1980)</u>, <u>Grace Eldering</u>, public health scientist and <u>Loney Gordon</u>, African-American chemist who developed the first vaccine for whooping cough (pertussis) and ran the first largescale controlled clinical trial for the pertussis vaccine. Kendrick was instrumental in establishing US standards for vaccines.

So, here we are in the midst of another pandemic with many groups working on containment, cures and vaccines. I am wishing all of our members, their families and friends safe, virus-free holiday celebrations of Easter and Passover . . . although some families may be celebrating virtually by SKYPE, Facetime, Facebook, What'sApp or other means—extreme but very safe social distancing.
