Speaker: Anna M. Elias



Author Anna Elias is a graduate of the University of Florida with a degree in Production. She is also a member of our AAUW branch. Anna began her career as Don Johnson's assistant on *Miami Vice* then moved on to major feature films such as *Nell, The Rainmaker,* the *Client, 12 Monkeys, A Time to*

Kill and *Practical Magic*. She has written and co-written spec films, TV scripts, and award-winning shorts. Anna's passion for justice translates to her work. On the set of John Grisham's *A Time to Kill*, Canton Mississippi had just suffered a great racial hardship and division in a mayoral race. With Anna's encouragement, the movie crew made extra efforts to befriend, buy from, and work with the townspeople, and it served to break down walls of inequality and injustice that had divided the town for decades. This impact was so positive that Dan Rather traveled there to tape a two-part special for *48-Hours*. Anna's desire for fairness and justice are also at the heart of her writing. Her works are varied and entertaining, but always have a seed of social relevance inside.

Anna's debut novel, *The Vessels* is a supernatural thriller, emotionally compelling and complex, conjuring a world in which the living can become Vessels for the spirits of the dead. The Vessels program purports to do good by allowing spirits the chance to right the wrongs they committed in life but only have seven days to succeed – and survive. Every spirit has the chance to atone, no matter what hurt or harm they caused in their mortal life. Elias challenges her readers' ideas about forgiveness, an especially timely topic amid today's brutal cancel culture. 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Florida Poly celebrates International Day of Women and Girls in Science

The Car Heater

Margaret A Wilcox invented the car heater in 1893! It made driving easy in foggy and frigid weather by keeping windows mist free and also maintained the car interior at chosen temperatures, making the driving experience more comfortable and safer.

Margaret also invented a combined clothes and dishwasher. [Now that we'd like to see! ed.]

<u>Monopoly</u>



This popular board game was designed by **Elizabeth Magie** in 1904, originally called the Landlord's Game. The purpose of this game was to expose the injustices of unchecked capitalism. Her game was ripped off by Charles Darrow who sold it to Parker Brother's 30 years later. However Parker Brothers later paid Elizabeth \$500 for her game. Gee, thanks!

The Fire Escape



In 1887, in an effort to prevent the deaths of many living in multi-story buildings, **Anna Connelly** patented the exterior fire escape. This invention was actually a fire escape bridge that was surrounded by railings and with openings at the ends. Connelly's innovative idea allowed for the safe escape from one building to the next in the event there was a fire.

The Life Raft



Maria Beasely: One of Beasley's inventions that surely impacted her own life and others was her barrel making machine, which was patented in 1878 as her first patented invention. Her barrel making machine earned her "an unprecedented payday of over \$20,000 a year," which would translate to well over \$450,000 today. Beasley's design for the life raft was patented in 1882 and would save many lives.
