Holiday time is here! Our branch of AAUW has a special opportunity each year to assure the girls from PACE a meaningful Christmas.

This year we will be hosting our festive event on Friday, December 17, at the PACE Center. We begin the morning doing two separate crafts with the girls. We've learned through the years that teens absolutely love doing crafts! Following the craft time, the girls gather in their Community Room for a yummy breakfast which our members provide for them. After a short time to eat and socialize, this brings us to the much-anticipated Miracle Bag gifts.



Our branch asks as many members as possible to support one PACE girl for Christmas. PACE staff work with our AAUW/PACE committee to provide a wish for every girl totaling up to \$25.

Our AAUW committee then orders each gift online. The wishes are delivered to PACE, and the committee gathers to fill the bags with the delivered wishes as well as donated gift cards and smaller items that teens would

use, love, and appreciate. We ask our AAUW members to support one girl's Miracle Bag by sending a check for \$25 (see directions below). Your name will be on the gift tag for the girl, and the committee will keep in touch with you so you know your girl's name and wish. You could include a card with a message to your "adopted" girl if you would like. Cards could be brought to the Saturday, December 11, General Meeting and taken by a committee member to PACE on the day the bags are filled.






Thank you from Karen Gillett

HAPPY 100th BIRTHDAY, PEARL

Pearl Steele was born in Scranton, PA on December 14, 1921. She attended the secretarial section of high school, then one year of business college. She subsequently worked for Met Life Insurance Company and Globe Department Store in the accounting office and was a secretary in the Pennsylvania

Baptist Convention.

On her twenty-fifth birthday in December 1946, she moved to Rangoon, Burma (now Myanmar) where she worked for the American Baptist Mission as secretary for 3 years. She traveled first on the Queen Mary ocean liner to England and then by sea plane with stopover landings in various rivers including the Nile. After coming back from Burma, she went to college in Ottawa University in Kansas for a year, then transferred to Peabody College in Nashville, TN where

she received her B.S degree. During her travels, she took graduate level courses in Japan, Korea, Hawaii and Florida. After graduating from Peabody, she taught elementary school in Michigan for one year. She decided it was too cold there so she moved to Hawaii and taught for 2 years. In Hawaii she also worked for the census bureau and the Department of Health. Pearl joined AAUW in 1953 in Hawaii.

Pearl moved to Korea in 1956 and was there until 1964 working in the U.S. Foreign Aid Program. She worked in Tokyo, Japan for a year in 1958. She met and married her husband Dick in Korea. They moved to Hilo, Hawaii in 1964 where she continued to be active in AAUW as

> chapter treasurer as well as active in her church. Pearl and Dick moved to College Park, FL in 1987 to be closer to her aging parents. She then joined the AAUW Orlando-Winter Park chapter. She also joined the Orlando Garden Club and the Methodist Church in College Park.

Pearl has been a world traveler from an early age. In 1969, Pan Am airline offered around-the-world flight passes as a packaged flight plan. The only rule was you had to keep traveling in the same direction. Pearl, Dick and her parents spent several months traveling the world on this plan. Pearl has continued her world-wide

travels with various tour companies. Her most recent trip was an Alaska Cruise in September.

Pearl continues to stay very active attending AAUW meetings and special interest groups as well as church and garden club meetings. She enjoys reading, gardening, doing 1,000-piece jigsaw puzzles, embroidery, and corresponding with friends all over the world.




I feel that it was really a gift to our whole branch. I display it at all times in my home, and occasionally bring it


