Jean Wright was an Aerospace Composite Tech for United Space Alliance—the prime contractor for NASA's Space Shuttle Processing. As one of 18 women in this critical role, she and

her co-workers, who dubbed their group, "The Sew Sisters," were responsible for fabrication, assembly, disassembly, installation and repair of Thermal Protection System (TPS) hardware. This involved using detailed measurements, heavy-duty industrial sewing machines, and intricate and physically demanding hand stitching which covered many areas of the shuttle orbiter.

A motivational speaker, Jean has been asked to present at many prestigious events such as the International Quilt Festival along with astronaut Karen Nyberg, in Houston, Texas; the Northeast Astronomy Forum (NEAF) in N.Y.; the Keynote Speaker at MQX -Machine Quilters Exposition in N.H.; Women's History Month at KSC Visitor Complex; Family Day at the Udvar-Hazy National Air and Space Museum; and at Spacefest. Jean has done many TV, radio, and online interviews and has been featured in many magazine and newspaper articles.

Currently a docent at the Space Shuttle Atlantis Exhibit, educating and entertaining guests at the KSC Visitor Complex, Jean also does launch support and VIP Tours as needed, including a recent tour for former NASA Administrator, Jim Bridenstein. And now a part of the media photographing launches as a team member for the space blog, "SpaceUpClose."

From the President

AAUW is a leading voice in advancing gender equity for



women and girls - and everyone through research, education and advocacy. We have been 'at this' for nearly twice my life time-141 years which is why this year I am so profoundly disgusted with our Florida state legislature and Governor for the passage of bills—by partisan votes—that undermine our funda-

mental mission. The bills that gerrymander districts hamper voters' ability to submit valid ballots, and police patrolling the polls suppress voter turnout among individuals in opposition to the ruling party. These measures disproportionally affect women who hold the majority of hourly-wage low-paying jobs and are burdened by the high cost of childcare.

More directly egregious are the bills that take jurisdiction over women's reproductive health decisions and criminalize and significantly limit options that are still the law of the land. In addition, many bills passed that severely curtail the content of public school education for Florida's nearly 2.8 million PreK-12th grade children and adolescents. The dictum seems to be: spare the historic and contemporary truths and spoil the ability of young citizens to think critically and to knowledgeably engage in the democratic process. America's past and

present are 'mixed bags' of laws, events, and people about which we should feel embarrassed, uncomfortable, and dismayed. How could this be our heritage? . . But it is, and there is a plethora of racial, religious, sexist, xenophobic and other forms of individual and legal institutional discrimination that students should know about. ACE's are real but these adverse childhood experiences, that can have lasting influences on one's life, are not perpetrated in the classroom by teachers discussing factual information about slavery and gender diversity. They are perpetuated by parental and family dynamics embracing ignorance over knowledge and hate over tolerance and acceptance.

So, in my last column as your President, I encourage us all to use our tools of research, education, and advocacy as we work to make changes in our institutions and elect candidates who support our mission.

In closing, an enormous 'thank you' to our Orlando/ Winter Park Branch members for their support, generosity, and accomplishments over the last four years. I am proud to have served with the most incredibly committed, smart, and talented past and current Board members. We are in good hands, and our AAUW Branch has a bright future—maybe even another 94 years!

Her educational aspirations include completing her degree with certifications in entrepreneurship and health systems that will provide structure to work within the prosthetic field while having an understanding of how to open her own business. Though body building's all the rage, I've gotta tell ya sister,


I'd much rather be bench-pressing dacron-polyester.

The book we will be discussing this year is *Dr. Thorne*. Written in 1858, Dr. Thorne is the third book in Trollope's Barchestershire series. Son of a bankrupt landowner, Frank Gresham is intent on marrying his beloved Mary Thorne, despite her illegitimacy and apparent pov-

erty. Frank's ambitious mother and haughty aunt are set against the match, however, and push him to save the family's mortgaged estate by making a good marriage to a wealthy heiress. Only Mary's loving uncle, Dr. Thorne, knows the secret of her birth and the fortune she is to inherit that will make her socially acceptable in the eyes of Frank's family, but the high-principled doctor believes she should be accepted



on her own terms. A telling examination between society, money and morality, "Dr. Thorne" is enduringly popular for Trollope's affectionate depiction of rural English life and his deceptively simple portrayal of human nature. (Amazon)

NOTE: The book has 562 pages, so members should plan to start reading it early.
