Geri Throne is a journalist, freelance writer and author of *Secret Battles*, her first novel. A native of New Jersey, she studied journalism at Syracuse University. Most of her career was spent at the *Orlando Sentinel* newspaper as an investigative reporter, editor, and editorial writer before turning to creative writing and fiction. Her writing accomplishments include a first-place national award from the Education Writers Association for her editorial series on voucher schools and a first-place short story fiction award from the Florida First Coast Writers.

During her later years at the *Orlando Sentinel*, Throne became interested in writing a book set in World War II when her father gave her a box full of

wartime letters and journals. Not until after he died did she open the journals describing dangerous nearmisses and heartbreaking losses in gripping detail. Yet letters to his wife rarely mentioned those events. Wondering what scars her father brought home from the war, she subsequently wrote a nonfiction account of his war time ex-

periences for the Sentinel's Florida Magazine.

Throne's book, *Secret Battles*, stays as close as possible to her father's Ninth Infantry Division's role in the war while using her imagination to create the novel and its unforgettable non-historic characters. Through her parents' letters, Throne shares the intimate struggle in *Secret Battles* of two people writing to keep hope and love alive during dark years in their lives.

Throne lives in Winter Park with her husband Ron and Coco, the wonder dog. She loves traveling, camping, boating and the sea.

Advance gender equity for women and girls at Lobby Days 2023

March 13 to March 15

We will meet legislators face to face after two years of virtual lobbying due to the pandemic.

The AAUW Florida Public Policy Committee is working now to establish the 2022-2023 legislative agenda and planning a Lobby Day experience that will focus on public policy priorities: economic security, education, and civil rights.

Strength in numbers.

Meeting legislators in person is an effective and exciting way to make sure they understand AAUW positions on our priority issues. And there's strength in numbers. If every branch sent representatives to lobby, our case would be more powerful. Please start now to assemble a group from your branch.

We realize it is a commitment of time and money, so AAUW Florida will offer a small stipend to help offset travel costs. Stipend: graduated scale (\$50-\$80) depending on your driving distance plus \$50 to help with lodging. This is to help with expenses, not cover all of them.

Schedule: Our Lobby Days are planned near the start of the 2023 legislative sessions, which runs from March 7 to May 5.

AAUW advocates should plan to arrive in Tallahassee on **Monday night, March 13**, for a short meeting in preparation for our visit to the capitol on **Tuesday, March 14**.

A Pre-Lobby Day Legislative Agenda/Public Policy Discussion and training session will be conducted, 2 March 2023 @ 7:00 p.m. prior to our departure for Tallahassee, addressing the "who, what, when, where, why and how of Lobby Days." Please register for this Zoom event even if you will not be attending lobby days for information on how to advance gender equity through advocacy.

Given the recent necessity to register for absentee ballots, you might be interested in this painting by Mary Cassatt. Although she was known for her paintings of mothers and children, this painting bore a powerful political message. The sunflower was the official symbol of the National American Woman Suffrage Association. By the time Cassatt painted *Woman with a Sunflower* around 1905, sunflowers had appeared on all kinds of official and promotional suffrage materials, such as a button emblazoned with the phrase "We want to vote for president in 1904."

I am the president of FL National Organization for Women and the Greater Orlando National Organization for Women. We are planning an Equal Pay Day Rally for March 18 (the first equal pay day is March 15, but that's during the week) at 11 a.m. outside of City Hall. We have a number of organizations participating or we are waiting on their confirmations. We think the gender pay gap fits into your mission, so we want to invite you to have a speaker and ask you to get the word out to attend the rally. This event is about keeping awareness up and being seen rallying around closing the gender pay gap.

Story of a 25 year old member: She works for WAWA right

now. She got a raise of \$.30/hour, but found out that the men got a 50 cents to \$1.00 raise. When she asked why they said it was based on productivity which is baloney. I was surprised that this overt discrimination could happen at a big company. The tip worker and domestic worker worlds underpin a lot of the gender pay gap.

We should connect on advocacy in the future if you are interested."

- -- Women hold nearly two-thirds of the outstanding student debt, and receive less Social Security and pensions-amounting to 70% of the retirement income that men

have?

- -- Women decide more than 85% of purchases in the US economy?
- -- Women's unrecognized inventions and discoveries in medicine and science impact every aspect of our lives?
- -- Women are paid an average of 82 cents for every dollar a man earns for the SAME job? (See the Lilly Ledbetter law that President Obama signed in 2009!)
- -- Women die from many medical procedures and drug doses that are safe for men? Why? Because they were developed largely by men, using men for research!
- -- Same goes for airbags, seat belts and other safety equipment? A woman will die from a car accident that three men would survive!

Women have invented, discovered, and created so many improvements to our lives—but women's history that might inspire the women in our world—our daughters and granddaughters—has not been taught. Inform yourselves!

March has been designated as Women's History Month! Celebrate by registering to vote, continue learning about issues that affect you and your community, supporting and voting for candidates who will represent your best interests!




