"Fairolyn H. Livingston '83 Rollins College Graduate, Chief Historian of the Hannibal Square Heritage Center, a program of Crealde's School of Art, forged her path to advocacy at Rollins College." ROLLINS SUMMER 2021 MAGAZINE, described this woman as "the institutional memory" of Winter Park's west side where she was born and raised.

Fairolyn graduated from Hungerford High School in Eatonville, FL, and earned an associate's degree from Hampton Junior College in 1966, located in Ocala, FL (today's College of Central Florida). As an adult with two children, she took care of unfinished business when she graduated from Rollins Hamilton Holt School.

In the late 90's a group of residents attempted unsuccessfully to save the Ideal Woman's Club building from demolition. The building had once belonged to the First Congregational Church of Winter Park.

The group's efforts led to Fairolyn's receiving a joint grant from the Winter Park Public Library and Rollins College's Olin Library, that birthed her ongoing and continuous indepth historical research of Winter Park's West Side residents, places, things and events.

Our Branch has had some good news this past month. Among them are:

Our Literary Luncheon was quite successful this year. We had over 100 attendees and were able to add over \$4000 toward our Scholarship funds.

Roberta Cooper, our representative on the PACE Board, has reported that through her recommendation, the University Club of Winter Park has donated \$2935 to PACE, and our Branch contributed \$1290 to the National Greatest Needs fund.

We have also received a grant from Florida AAUW for our project: Sewage: If your Pipes Could Talk.

Coming up will be the election of new officers for our Branch. Further information is forthcoming.

National by-laws changes are being drafted. Once the new by-laws are approved, affiliates will need to amend

their bylaws to reflect the necessary changes. Because the changes are mandated by AAUW, they can be made by affiliates without a membership vote. Affiliates will have at least two years to make these changes. As further information is received, we will keep you apprised.

Our summer "hiatus" will begin in June with suspension of our regular meetings, and begin again in September. Keep in mind that many of our activities do not take the summer off. Check with your group leaders. We will be sending our members a questionnaire via email asking for assistance in formulating plans for next year's meetings.

EXTRA EXTRA—READ ALL ABOUT IT! LESLIE AND HANNA MAKE GOVERNOR'S 'HIT LIST.'

[Because Drs. Hanna Kruczek and Leslie Sue Lieberman made it to Governor DeSantis's hit list, they were interviewed by Sarah Blaskey, an investigative journalist with the *Miami Herald*.]

Their 'crime'? They were invited speakers at the 2022 FL Polytechnic University event celebrating the International Day of Women and Girls in Science. This event also brought middle school girls to campus.

Blaskey writes: That mission earned the event a spot on a blacklist of university and college programs that Florida Gov. Ron DeSantis describes as "discriminatory" efforts, which, he joked, have the same educational value as a degree in "Zombie Studies." Leslie continues: Of course it is not a joke and he and the FL Legislature are ready to eliminate all courses, majors, minors, programs, offices, departments, institutes, and centers that have anything to do with gender, sex, women, diversity, race, ethnicity and intersectionality, usually inclusive of social class and to control the hiring and firing of faculty and administrators.

Please write or call your legislators and tell them not to pass HB999 /SB 266.

Female students from Academy Prep Center of Lakeland attended an International Day of Women and Girls in Science event at Florida Polytechnic University in February. The young women heard from female scientists about the possibilities open to them in the sciences.

When she visited Florida Polytechnic University with a group of girls from her middle school class last month, Sarah imagined herself in college learning how to use the beakers and Bunsen burners she saw while touring the chemistry lab. As a sixth-grader, Sarah was at the age when studies show that girls first start to fall behind in fields of science and technology — a trend that continues into college and the workforce. The day her class spent on campus commemorating the International Day of Women and Girls in Science by building catapults out of plastic spoons was supposed to encourage the students to break the trend.

- ... That mission earned the event a spot on a blacklist of university and college programs that Florida Gov. Ron DeSantis describes as "discriminatory" efforts, which, he joked, have the same educational value as a degree in "Zombie Studies."
- ... In more than a dozen interviews with the *Herald*, faculty and staff described a quiet calculus happening behind the scenes on campuses as educators navigate an increasingly hostile work environment resulting from vague and ever-evolving directives coming from Tallahassee. Trainings and events have been preemptively canceled pending proposed legislation. Fearful of becoming the next viral post on anti-DEI social media accounts, some professors said they are changing the way they teach. Others started recording their own lectures in order to defend themselves should someone take their comments out of context. Many are considering leaving the state.
- ... The process of compiling lists and turning over emails to the government has Florida educators "completely spooked," said Meera Sitharm, a professor of computer science and mathematics at UF and the chief negotiator for the faculty union. DeSantis' legislative proposals would empower the college board to hire and fire faculty, regardless of tenure status, "thus enabling these

boards to dismiss faculty that may be pushing prohibited programs," the governor's office said in a statement to the *Herald*. "People are feeling vulnerable. Certainly it has increased the faculty feeling that they are being watched," Sitharm said. "It's almost McCarthyist."

- ... Records obtained by the *Herald* show administrators at public colleges have started to preemptively rename diversity offices in hopes of sidestepping proposed bans. Other programs are seeking alternative funding sources outside the university system after DeSantis threatened to cut off certain programs from state funding so that they "wither on the vine."
- ... HB999, one of the bills laying out the proposed bans, currently includes language that would exempt dozens of programs that made the initial list, including those serving veterans, first-generation college students, and "students from low-income families, or students with unique abilities."
- . . . School by school, the lists were developed behind closed doors by university administrators in consultation with the Florida Board of Governors as they scrambled to fulfill DeSantis' information request in just two weeks over winter break. At the University of West Florida, staff searched the course catalog for the keywords "diversity, race, ethnicity, equity, inclusion/inclusive, cultural, gender, sex/sexuality, international and poverty," according to a statement in response to *Herald* questions. Deans then went through the results of the initial search, adding and subtracting programs and classes based on their own judgment before sending the list up the chain to the Board of Governors.
- ... Leslie Lieberman, a retired professor who was a guest speaker for Florida Polytechnic's science event for girls, said she plans to write her former employer, the University of Central Florida, out of her will. "I cannot support an institution that does not support diversity and free speech," Lieberman said. "If more people would be willing to do that, I think that might have an impact."


