Our November 4 program **"More Than Home Ec and Shop"** describes the exciting and surprisingly diverse high school career and technical programs offered at Seminole County Public High Schools. The goal of these programs is to have students graduate with diplomas, certifications and on-the job experience that lead to high-demand, high-wage employment. These programs are important alternative career pathways

particularly for women because of the disproportionate college debt incurred by women. The Florida Department of Education has 17 career clusters. In response, Seminole County Public Schools offer 64 high school programs with a wide variety of career opportunities including: health sciences, engineering, finance, culinary arts, cybersecurity, modeling & simulation, creative design & entertainment, forensic sciences, manufacturing, aviation, renewable energy, public service, etc. These programs, designed to meet current and future workforce needs, involve industry, businesses, government entities, trade organizations and dual enrollment at the state colleges at no cost to the student. Students graduate with a clear understanding of career options and training in these areas.

Ms. Kristin Thole is a Seminole County School District Administrator who facilitates many of these programs. Prior to this role, she began her career pathway working in the business world and then later took on a second career path where she moved into education and was a District-Based Instructional Coach and Lead Teacher for students with Emotional and Behavioral Disabilities across the country.

She has been back in the Orlando area for about 10 years. She is a sought-after public speaker and some of you may have seen her in action at the Sewage: If Your Pipes Could Talk event where she discussed the LBHS Wastewater Management Program. Although she graduated from Lake Brantley High School, she went far away for her education. She has a B.A. in International Business Management from the American College, Dublin, Ireland, and her Master's in Education degree from Northern Arizona University. She was a cultural exchange student in Switzerland and is fluent in French. Additionally, Ms. Thole is currently a volunteer coordinator with Youth for Understanding (YFU), International Exchange Program, working with foreign students and American host families.

In this third and final installment of the series, the Vessels are in peril. Their program is under attack, Link's freedom hangs by a thread, and Sam's granddaughter is still missing after bringing Eric Bonner's deadly spirit back to this realm. When Eric forces Sam's estranged son, Governor Ron Galt, to become his Vessel, their shared thirst for power and revenge unleashes a tide of evil that threatens the soul of humankind.

Until a surprising new Spirit Guard returns. One sent to

help Sam and the Vessels stop Ron and remove Eric's spirit for good. But doing so will come at the highest price – pitting Sam against Ron, father against son, in an ultimate battle only one can survive.

After graduating from the University of Florida, Anna traveled the country working on such studio films and TV series as *Miami Vice, In the Heat of the Night, Nell, Practical Magic, 12 Monkeys, A Time to Kill, and My Dog Skip.* Anna parlayed that film experience into screenwriting, then expanded into prose with her debut novels, *The Vessels* and *The Coin. The Return* is her third and final book in that series.

Anna has lived in Orlando for 26 years. Her lifelong passion for social justice, diversity, human and civil rights, and climate care is found throughout her books and scripts. But they are paramount in her life, as well, through her movie work, her volunteer work, and her activism. Anna helped build Spirit of Joy Lutheran Church in East Orlando, and she created a Doing Justice Team that, among other outreach efforts, helped build the Samaritan Resource Center for the homeless and at-risk.
