It is time to renew your dues!

Scholarships



BRANCH SCHOLARSHIP

The application is on the website, and applications are submitted to my email (kgb@unknownegg.org) between January 1 and March 1. Applicants need to be enrolled at a region-

ally accredited college or university, preferably in the Central Florida area, or at least in Florida. Women (and men) are eligible—with some preference given to applicants who are returning to complete a degree or have overcome some challenges in completing their degree, plus their obvious enthusiasm and passion in pursuing their chosen career.

VALENCIA COLLEGE FOUNDATION ENDOWED SCHOLARSHIP

During the summer, I was notified that the Valencia Foundation was changing their scholarship review and award process to move the decision process from the sponsoring organization/donor to their large Foundation Committee. While this simplifies our work, we still have input. As stated in the Endowed Scholarship Agreement, the Fund will provide scholarship for Valencia College students who meet the following criteria established by AAUW:

- 1. Pursuing a degree in Business (criteria set forth by the originator of the scholarship, a member of AAUW).
- 2. Minimum GPA of 3.0.
- 3. Demonstrate participation in extracurricular and/or volunteer activities.
- 4. Demonstrates financial need.
- 5. Preference will be given to students who have overcome educational challenges prior to entering college (an alternative solution since we cannot name PACE attendance specifically).
- 6. Students awarded money from this fund may use the money for tuition, books, and fees.
- 7. When feasible, annual awards will be distributed evenly between a minimum of two recipients.


We will receive the names and brief information about the student(s) chosen to receive our Scholarship each year.

PACE NEXT-STEP GRANT

This grant was begun several years ago specifically for girls who have attended PACE and graduated from high school. While funds can be used for college/university degree programs, funds can also be used for trade/technical courses. There have not been many applicants – but – we are planning to work with the PACE staff this fall to promote this opportunity.

PACE Center for Girls – A Little Background

More than 25 years ago, our AAUW branch began supporting PACE Center for Girls. This relationship is based on our mutual belief in equi-

ty for women and girls, along with our knowledge that education and belief in ourselves are key to accessing choices in life. The PACE program has proven to be an excellent match for our branch. Over and over, statistics show that 8 in 10 girls who had been failing in school, and then enter the PACE program, will improve their grades as well as their positive belief that they will succeed. Our AAUW members offer support to PACE in several ways – books, supplies, food pantry, scholarships and sponsoring special events.

Thanksgiving Lunch

Our first big event with PACE is the traditional Thanksgiving Lunch, held the Thursday before Thanksgiving, 11/21/2024. All AAUW members are invited to attend and serve the lunch, to bring a dish for the meal, or contribute money to purchase the turkeys and anything else needed. The girls and their families really look forward to this meal, and we AAUW women certainly enjoy providing it. There will be sign-up sheets at the September and October meetings to designate your contribution. Checks should be made out to AAUW Orlando Winter Park.

Food Pantry

A few years ago PACE asked AAUW to start a food pantry. One of the first girls to need the food was a girl whose mother was dying in the hospital leaving this girl to go home and fix dinner for her younger siblings. We

ask that you bring food to each general meeting. Leaders of our interest groups are encouraged to collect food and arrange for it to be delivered to PACE. This year PACE wants to create meal kits which provide balanced and nutritious meals for the girls who need food for their homes. Each month we will feature two different meals and ask that members bring items needed to prepare those meals.

- 1. Barbequed Chicken Burrito Bowls
 - 1 (9.76 oz) can white chicken
 - 1 bottle BBQ sauce
 - 1 (15 oz) can black beans
 - 1 (15 oz) can corn
 - 1 (14 oz) box instant brown rice
 - 2 cans pears or other fruit
- 2. Chicken Chili
 - 1 (14.5 oz) can chicken broth
 - 1 (4.5 oz) can diced green chilies
 - 1 (12.5 oz) can chicken breast
 - 2 (15.5 oz) cans beans, kidney, red, pinto or black
 - 1 (14.5 oz) can petite diced tomatoes
 - 1 can white corn
 - 1 (8 oz) tomato sauce
 - 1 packet chili seasoning



[The following was submitted by Georgiana A. Havill] IOpinion comment in today's Washington Post Aug 28, 2024: "Masked protesters, kids' unmasked book picks: When is anonymity okay?" By Marc Fisher

"To mask or not to mask. In the late 70s, my advertising offices were on the ninth floor of the Dupont Circle Building (1346 Connecticut Avenue). Often I was the only person on a descending elevator not wearing a brown paper bag over my head. It was understood that the (purportedly) Iranian students were headed out to march and demonstrate in protest to their country's leadership (and I was told, sometimes to US policies). However, it was clear that they had safety to do so only if their identities stayed unknown. Remaining anonymous was an imperative.

As for "unmasking" children's reading choices from libraries, they are seeking knowledge and information. Their freedom to navigate history, opinion, and facts is a fundamental right to being a fullyrealized citizen who'll help propel this nation forward."

Virginia (Ginny) Stuart August 19, 1931—May 19, 2004

Virginia Emilie "Ginny" Stuart, 92, passed away on Sunday, May 19, 2024, after a long, heart-breaking decline brought on by dementia.


Ginny was born in Irvington, NJ, the beloved only child of Henry Kriegsmann and Emilie Kurzenberger. She graduated from Columbia High School in Maplewood, NJ, and in 1953, earned a BA in South American Studies from Douglass College at Rutgers University.

At a local NJ farm called Mrs. Prince's Fruit Stand, Ginny met James R. "Jim" Stuart, and they were married in 1956. Together, they raised three daughters:

Donna Stuart (Dean Pickering) of Forest, VA; Holly Stuart (Jacob Stuart Sr.) of Winter Park, FL; and Joy Stuart Willey (David Willey) of Delaplane, VA. Over the years, their family grew to include six grandchildren and six greatgrandchildren who lovingly called her "Gram."

Following college, Ginny worked for Prudential Insurance Company in the Group Insurance Department as a calculation reviewer. In 1967, Jim was offered the opportunity to work for Martin Marietta and the family moved to Winter Park, Florida. Ginny devoted herself to her family and to being an active volunteer at the Central Florida Civic Theater, the Citrus Council of Girl Scouts, First Congregational Church of Winter Park, and the American Association of University Women.

Ginny's volunteerism paved the way for a return to the workforce at the Women's Program Center at Valencia Community College. By the time she retired in 1996, she



For her deep commitment to the community, she was honored by numerous civic, arts, and education organizations and was recognized with a Summit Award from the Women's Resource Center in 1993.

She enjoyed travel and, in her lifetime, vis-

ited seven continents and more than 50 countries. She was happiest spending summers in Banner Elk, NC, weekends in New Smyrna Beach, and visiting family and friends around the country. She enjoyed knitting, theater and symphony performances, was a competitive Bridge player, and loved hosting large family holiday celebrations. Among her greatest joys was taking care of her daughters and newborn grandbabies.
