Our guest speaker this month is Dr. Scott Lubaroff.

Dr. Lubaroff's presentation *The American Band:*What's in a Name and So Much More relates the fascinating history of the development and diversity of bands—marching bands,

concert bands, military bands, dance bands, symphonic bands, jazz bands. He will incorporate clips of music from these different bands.

Professor of Music and Director of Bands at the UCF, he conducts the award-winning Wind Ensemble and oversees four concert bands, chamber winds, the 400+ member Marching Knights, and the Jammin' Knights Pep Band. Under his direction many of these groups have made commercial recordings.

He is a performing musician, a composer, a widely sought-after conductor in the US and internationally, a teacher, and an author of articles and a book on the neo-classical wind music of Igor Stravinsky. He earned his DMA from Michigan State University, and MFA, MA, and BM degrees from the University of Iowa. He has been the recipient of many awards, and at the University of Central Missouri (2005-17) received the Governor's Award for Excellence in Education. Dr. Lubaroff is a passionate advocate for the development of new music for mixed winds and for combined acoustic and electroacoustic instruments. He is a member of many professional organizations and is a staunch defender of music education in America's schools

REVIEW OF FALL PREVENTION STRATEGIES

On Wednesday, October 23, the University Club of Winter Park and the Orlando/Winter Park branch of AAUW, sponsored jointly a program on fall prevention strategies. Every seat was taken by 102 attendees. The first-time event was free and open to the public to hear noted lecturer, Dr Nicole Dawson, of

the UCF's College of Health Professions and Sciences. She enlightened the audience with revelations about the statistics and likelihood of falling and gave tips about avoiding falls. It was a pleasure to pay attention, not only to her clear explanations, but because the audio/visual system worked perfectly! She gave her surprise (to me) opinion that all of us need to get a falling risk assessment before we are hurt and are prescribed physical therapy! Dawson's listeners seemed completely engaged.

Personally, I could think only of one improvement that should be implemented for our next public service program. We need a table displaying our brochures, interest groups, etc. Some little bites and beverages would be a good draw to get attendees to the table! Another way to disseminate the literature might simply be to place those brochures on each chair.


