

ABOUT THE AUTHOR

Madeline Martin is a *New York Times, USA Today, Publisher's Weekly* and internationally bestselling author of forty historical fiction and historical romance novels, whose books have been translated into over twenty-five different languages. At the Literary Luncheon, Ms. Martin will speak about her latest heartwarming and compelling novel, *The Booklover's Library* that has been nominated for the 2024 Goodreads Choice Awards for Best Historical Fiction.

The Booklover's Library is a well-researched tale of a mother and daughter in wartime England and the power and solace of books that brings them together and helps them to find hope in the darkest of times. According to the author "this book truly comes from my heart and is based on so much of my personal life."

The Booklist starred review noted that "Martin infuses *The Booklovers Library* with an array of historical details, highlighting the strength and courage needed by every citizen in a wartime effort. The novel is a feast for the senses – the sound of air-raid sirens, the taste of rationed butter, the smell of freshly brewed tea." Martin lives in Florida with her two amazing daughters, two incredibly spoiled cats and a man so wonderful he has been dubbed "Mr. Awesome."

She is a die-hard history lover who will happily lose herself in research any day. She also loves travel, attributing her fascination with history to having spent most of her childhood as an Army brat in Germany.

Here's what you missed if you didn't come to the General Meeting on February 8:



The new administration promises to deport millions of undocumented people. Nancy Rudner, a former AAUW speaker, presented some facts about the approximately 12 million undocumented people in Florida. She also passed out red cards which can be given

to an undocumented worker or anyone who thinks they know someone who might be one. These cards, printed in about 19 different languages, explain what their rights are.

Our main speaker, Sharife Gacel, spoke about being an analogue astronaut for NASA. The topic was one which obviously intrigued many of our members and produced one of the highest number of attendees at a general meeting.



In brief, analogue astronauts simulate on earth (usually in remote locations like a mountain or desert) the conditions that will one day face astronauts on the moon or on another planet. They live in a small area, eat what would be available to them outside earth, and even don space suits when they want to go outside.

Initially scheduled for January, Exploring Central Florida's trip to the Sculpture Garden in Lake Nona ran into a force that even the bull couldn't vanquish—the weather. But one month later, on February 28, the tour met at the Wave Hotel to stroll through the gardens, enjoy lunch at the hotel's Garni Café, and the weather couldn't have been more perfect. Jeannie Bubriski prepared handouts for everyone giving details of the different sculptures and the sculptors. Kudos to Jeannie for volunteering to act as our guide.

PACE Food Pantry Recipe

(Please bring to the general meeting or deliver to PACE items from this recipe so that the girls can bring home healthy meal ingredients.)

Vegetable Lo Mein

- 1 box spaghetti
- 1 (4oz) can mushrooms
- 1 tablespoon canola oil
- 1 (28 oz) can La Choy Stir Fry Vegetables
- 1 (14.5 oz) bottle La Choy Teriyaki Stir Fry Sauce and Marinade

Cook 8 oz spaghetti according to package directions, omitting salt. Set aside when done. Heat oil in deep pan over medium heat; add vegetables and mushrooms. Cook for 3 minutes, stirring occasionally. Add ½ cup water, ¾ cup Stir Fry Sauce and cooked spaghetti and bring to a boil. Reduce heat to simmer and cook for 5 minutes till Lo Mein is slightly thickened.


