From the PACE Team

Once again, the AAUW PACE Thanksgiving was a wonderfully delicious event. Many thanks to all the many members who made the day possible. Your generous donations of food and money let these girls experience a true and complete Thanksgiving. All the food you cooked was outstanding. We really appreciated that so many were there to experience the day and show support for the girls. Your presence was notable and enjoyed by the girls and the staff at PACE. The girls came through the line carrying plates loaded with that delicious food. Many, if not most, came back for seconds; and then they started on the desserts. Afterwards, the girls and staff were encouraged to take any leftovers home with them, and they certainly did. Any food left over was packed up for Pastor Jackson of the Black Bottom House of Prayer in Parramore. At that church they are always feeding the hungry, so we were happy that no food would go to waste.

It was both a very good day and a sad day knowing that our PACE center will be closing next month. But we are not done yet. On Monday, December 15, at 11 a.m., we will be throwing a pizza party for the girls. After pizza, we will assist the girls in making holiday cards. Then we will send them home with a gift card! We are still planning the day and welcome any ideas about how to make the day fabulous for the girls.

Many people have asked about why our center is clos-

ing. First of all, many of the PACE centers in Florida are in trouble; three centers have already closed. Of course, it comes down to money, and money comes from the number of girls at the center. There are just not enough girls at PACE right now. And why is that? Rocky, the Executive Director, very politically says that it is the "current climate." We all keep up with the news, and we know that the current climate includes the huge loss in students by Orlando Public Schools due to vouchers as well as the current immigration policy.

All of PACE is based on the relationship with the Florida Department of Juvenile Justice, which is its largest financial supporter. We understand that the DJJ really wants a program for girls here in Orange County. So we are told to consider this as a pause in service. And some time next year, there will be a review and reimagining of services, hopefully leading to a new formation of a program for the girls.

AAUW has had a long successful partnership with PACE. Thank you all for your encouragement and support of that partnership and especially of the girls.


Madeline Martin, AAUW's 2025 literary luncheon speak-

Tracey Enerson Woods, 2024 literary luncheon speaker, and a *USA Today* and International best-selling author shines a spotlight on anoth-



We have a Gift

'Tis the season for gifts. We have a gift for each other: the opportunity to gather and talk. Booklovers' talk recently concerned the length and topic of January's assigned book, *Bury My Heart at Wounded Knee* by Dee Brown. It is long book, a bit longer than our typical 400-page limit. The topic of how American Indians lost their land and liberty to white settlers moving westward is difficult. In her infinite wisdom, the powers-that-be scheduled this tome for our January title. Without an assigned book this month, December is available to begin the difficult process.

The process of tackling tomes is the subject of a November 18 article in the *New York Times*. Sebastian Castillo writes in his "The Secret to Getting Through Big, Dense, Difficult Books."

What is the point of this? Why are we doing this to ourselves? Is it merely a fetish for finishing a difficult book, the self-flattery it permits? None of us are academic philosophers, by any means; we have busy jobs and other pressing adult responsibilities. But the process has proved fruitful. A camaraderie emerges, I've found, when a group dedicates itself to a task that requires great effort. Learning is both painful and pleasant — and above all, communal.

And there is the gift. We do this for ourselves and for each other. How wonderful that we have this opportunity.
